Listening to God

Children's story

Friday night my boys joined us for part of *The Chosen* before their movie started. It started with the disciples going out and performing miracles. When we got home that night they were talking about how nice it would be if we could do miracles - and they're right. They then asked why we can't.

I don't have a solid answer to that.

Why can't you and I just stretch out our hands and heal? One theory is that it was a gift that was connected to being close the Jesus physically. That it was something the immediate disciples could do, at least sometimes, but it faded out.

Though some people say that it still happens, even if you exclude the television faith healers.

And then there are also stories, and perhaps you know some, of people who have had unexpected recoveries. There was no laying on of hands, but there was prayer. I know people how have experienced this.

There are also events I would describe as miraculous that not everyone would agree. I think medical teams can perform miraculous healings. I think science can do wonders. The sad part is we no longer give God the credit for giving us the creativity, or for the amazing possibilities we discover.

So, while it rarely happens like in the Bible, miracles do still happen.



🔻 Intro to the readings

- Today's section of Matthew follows straight after the Sermon on the Mount. What attracts your attention?
- The Psalm is one that people in today's reading would not only have known, but used as a prayer to comfort and guide them.

Reading: Please look up the passages in your own Bible,³ or click on the name to be taken to an online version. <u>Matthew 8</u>: 1-24 Psalm 77

Sermon: I am willing

Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts. Amen.

What sort of life would you choose? One that is quiet and stable, or one that has travel and adventure? One that brings you comforts and interesting options, or one that brings comfort to others? One that brings you recognition and glory, or just some quiet appreciation?

What sort of life would you choose?

When reading today's passage I was struck by Jesus saying, "I am willing." It got me thinking about what sort of life God chose as Jesus.

Jesus chose to travel. This wasn't to relax in the sun, experience exotic cultures, or see famous places around the Holy Land. While Matthew has told us that Jesus made his home in Capernaum (Matthew 4: 13), he travels so much he has less of a home than the "*birds of the air*". I like travelling, but even without all the walking I would find this exhausting - yet it's what Jesus chose. Why did he choose to travel so much? To get the Word out about the Kingdom of Heaven. He could have just been a Rabbi in a town: quiet Nazareth by his mom, or busier Capernaum. There he could have collected students and quietly taught them. Some of them would get their own students, and the news could seep out. It would definitely have been quieter. Instead, he chose to go to the people. He collects crowds into the thousands. He becomes famous - notorious for some. Is he out to be a superstar?

Jesus chose to take risks. How do you like risks? Today he got close to a leper - which brought the risk of catching the disease. (Although, for Jesus, that may not be much of a risk.) He did risk being kicked out of society. This was a big deal - as we'll see approaching Easter. Associating with somebody who is on the edge of society would normally contaminate Jesus just as much as a disease. Then we have a story of Jesus interacting with an official of Rome - the centurion. I'm not sure how you feel about the government, but imagine you had no say at all, they used an army to enforce their way - and they charged you for it. Choosing to associate with Rome would not have made you popular. Jesus not only listened to the Roman centurion, but helped him. Jesus then took a bigger risk and said the Centurion was better than many of the chosen people! These were shocking things to do and say. It's a wonder he didn't get a stone thrown at his head. Why choose to take such risks?

A choice that is surprising in the face of all these other choices is that Jesus encourages people to follow Jewish practices. The leper is told to go and show himself to the priests as Moses commanded. He gives similar instructions elsewhere. Is he changing the system or not?

When talking to the scribe, Jesus uses the term 'Son of Man' for the first time in Matthew. This reminds us of the choice God made in Jesus to come as a person. Really, God could have come

in any way. God could have come as a divine being towering over the nations. God could have come as a king riding in on a chariot throwing lighting around, leading an army like Rome - only scarier; or come as a voice speaking in everyone's head; or just taken over our free will. Instead, God chose to live as a person. While Jesus could do amazing things, he wasn't the first or last person in the Bible to heal, feed others, or even raise the dead. Jesus chose to be fully human.

Something Jesus didn't choose to be was the Lord. It's a title that shows up a lot in this passage. It recognizes Jesus' position, despite appearances, as the ruler over others. It also recognizes his power. Jesus didn't choose to be the Lord - but he did choose how to be Lord.

Often we think about how we can be better. That's good and important. It's also good to reflect on what God is like. How does Jesus choose to act as our Lord - as The Lord?

This is a Lord who doesn't wait for people to come make petitions, but goes out to them. God meets them in the street and in their homes. He meets with those who focus on leading religious lives, and those pushed to the outside - and those from the outside. Thinking of the Roman Centurion, it's like Jesus is receiving an immigrant or refugee into his Kingdom. In the next part of the chapter Jesus will even leave Israel, going outside to share the Kingdom. This is a Lord who chooses to go to people, listen to them, and help them.

This shows us that Jesus welcomes you, regardless of your background. You are welcome whether you think you're good or not - and not just you, so is everyone else. You can choose to immigrate into the Kingdom of Heaven, or arrive as a refugee looking for help. Jesus welcomes those who knock. More than that... Jesus is the Lord who goes out to invite everyone into the Kingdom. This is a Lord who risks being rejected to share the Kingdom. Why? Because it's worth it. Because God thinks that creation, including each person, is worth it.

This is a Lord who chooses to live into the talents/gifts he has. He is generous with what he can do: healing people so they can rejoin their communities. Helping people experience what it's like to live in the Kingdom of Heaven. Teaching people how to live in it.

It's not easy, but this is the sort of life that Jesus chose.

and the story doesn't end there, but part of what is going on is teaching people how to live in the Kingdom. Most people who encounter Jesus, like the Leper, Centurion, & Peter's mother-inlaw experience healing and then disappear from the narrative. We can imagine their life changed - how could it not be - but we don't hear about them taking on the radical life-style Jesus leads.

Some, though, ask to follow in Jesus' footprints. They've had a taste of the Kingdom and want more. The scribe says he wants to follow Jesus, and Jesus answers that this is a journey that never settles down. We assume the scribe goes home. We have disciples ask to bury his father - an important action in every culture. Jesus tells him, quite offensively, to 'let the dead bury their own dead'.

What's Jesus doing with these two? Isn't everyone welcome? If he's trying to gather people, why is he being so inconsiderate? What happened to the talk about loving others in the Sermon on the Mount?

Jesus is choosing to drive home the point, rather rudely, that living in the Kingdom of Heaven means not living according to the ways of this world. The values are different. (For one thing, you don't have to worry about death.) You're going to leave the familiar behind to experience what may seem like a world turned upside-down - a theme that dominates Jesus' parables, something we'll hear next week.

Our passage ends with some challenging verses about following Jesus. This part of the picture of what it means to follow Jesus. It talks about the hard stuff. Other parts of the picture include that the next scene is the disciples panicking in the boat and Jesus not abandoning them.

And the image of God we see in Jesus. The Lord who has power to heal, and goes out into the world offering this to everyone.

To God be all the Glory Amen.



- FaithTalk: These are some questions for you to discuss with somebody... or many somebodies. Do what you feel safe (and practice stretching a little).
- Memories: Who is somebody that you think has faith like that of the Leper and Centurion?
 - Etching: What's an inspiring thing you've heard somebody do?
- Memories: What's the craziest thing you've done for somebody? What were the risks involved?
 - Etching: Have you experienced extraordinary healing? or know somebody who has?
 - Values: How would you describe Jesus? God?

What aspects of The Lord do you value?
Wonder: How could Kensington help people experience, and live, more into the Kingdom of Heaven?
Prayer: ...thank God for the qualities that you appreciate in Jesus (and feel free to ask about the hard parts).

In many small rural communities in Ghana, lay preachers, evangelists and catechists play a crucial role. Under the direction of a district minister, who has many congregations under their care, lay leaders provide much-needed spiritual leadership. While they share a deep commitment to their call to ministry and service in the church,



many have not received formal theological training. To equip these lay leaders with helpful tools for effective ministry, the Presbyterian Church of Ghana established three Lay Training Centres (Tamale, Ramseyer and Nsaba), which receive support through Presbyterians Sharing.

Monday, February 13 We pray for congregations exploring ways to better support and include LGBTQI2+ people and their loved ones within their communities.


Tuesday, February 14 We pray for the people who gather and serve at Winnipeg Inner City Missions in Manitoba, and we give thanks for their ministry.
