✤ Intro to the readings

- We'll hear about Adam in Genesis 2. We think of Adam as a name. It's good to remember that it's also the word for dirt so in this passage Adam may be more of a description than a name.
- In what may be Paul's last letter in the Bible, we'll hear about waiting for the Messiah to return.

- You may find the responses in the psalm a bit repetitive. You could try to vary the way you say them, or go with it and make it more of a subconscious response...which could become an interesting part of your life.
- Reading: Please look up the passages in your own Bible,<sup>4</sup> or click on the name to be taken to an online version. <u>Genesis 2</u>: 4b-9, 18-22 <u>Romans 8</u>: 19-23 <u>Psalm 136</u>: 1-9, 23-26
  - Sermon: Creation's wonder

Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts. Amen.

I was talking to somebody this week who is already looking forward to winter, but most people are glad it's spring. Even my friend who tries to seal herself off because of allergies likes it. Why? because creation is beautiful.

It's been said before, but it's worth repeating: Creation is beautiful; it's wonderful; it is amazing.

Would you agree?

The bible certainly does. It's full of glowing descriptions of nature. There's passages about the land flowing with milk and honey. There's glorious feasts on the mountain with all the nations gathered. There's images like sailing on the wings of an eagle, or being gathered into the safety of a chicken's wings. There's trees flourishing beside streams. And there's the way it all starts. As God creates various parts of the universe in Genesis chapter one, God declared "And God saw that it was good." or, as a

storyteller I heard put it, God exclaimed "Ohh, I like that!"

Sometimes nature is just beautiful. You may find this in a sunset, or a flower, or a person, or a piece of music. I say 'just' because you don't go beyond that, but there's nothing 'just' about it. The beauty fills you up.

Sometimes creation can fill you with wonder - perhaps because of the scale or complexity of it. I've never seen it, but the Grand Canyon might fall into this category. In the Sermon on the Mount Jesus invites us to consider the lilies of the field and the birds of the air. They can 'just' be beautiful, but also amazing.

Birds (most of them) can fly! That's a wonder.<sup>5</sup> Have you ever watched them and wondered what it would be like? Then there's how different they are from us. They develop inside an egg. They have feathers, and no teeth or gums, and their brains are so small - yet they live so well... and there's astounding variety.

and the lilies. They don't have any brains at all. Their bodies are completely different from birds and us, but they are also complicated. They get water to defy gravity, and make food from sunlight. The flowers are intricately designed in a imaginative variety of ways to encourage insects to move pollen one to another.

Meister Eckhart said it nicely, "Every single creature is full of God and is a book about God. Every creature is a word of God." I'm sure that John and Carol could take is even smaller than the creatures and tell us about amazing things that happen on a microscopic scale. Science helps reveal just how full of wonder God's creation is.

Science, and the bible, remind us that not everything is animal and plant. Creation includes sand becoming diamonds, ... or glass for our buildings, or silicon for our computer circuits. Creation includes nature, farms and cities. There's the animals that live in the cities, but also the buildings and communities of people.

Science, and the bible, remind us that we, people, are part of creation - part of the environment. Sometimes we forget this, or have difficulty with it. I remember teaching about the scientific classification of living things. One student (about 12 years old) just couldn't accept that people were mammals, or even animals. We were special and different - and she wasn't all wrong. We are special and different (and also part of nature with lots in common).

In Genesis, chapter one starts with God creating the Heavens and the Earth and ending with the Sabbath. The last thing before resting "God created Adam (humankind) in his image, in the image of God he created them; male and female he created them." This makes us different from the birds of the air and the lilies of the field. We are made in God's image.

The second story of creation is even closer to the lesson my student needed to learn. Did you notice that all life is made from the same dirt as the first person? Chemists would be able with that inclusion as they've found that all life is based on the carbon atom. Person is made and invited to participate in a special way giving the animals their names (essentially defining who they are). This creativity is part of how we are like God.

God takes this person and places them in the Garden "*in the garden of Eden to till it and keep it.*" We can reshape creation; use creation - and look after it.

This is where things become problematic. Just before Jesus talks about the birds and lilies he warns that "*no one can serve two masters… You cannot serve God and wealth.*" In the push to create more, people prioritized using creation over keeping it.



Sometimes it was obvious that we were damaging the ecosystem, but it was more important to get the minerals, or farm land, or energy. Sometimes we just thought the environment would cleans itself - the water would get itself clean by the next city... and we didn't think about the animals. Sometimes the impact wasn't obvious. Plastic was an amazing invention, and there was no thought of the micro-plastics we now have in our soil and water, or the floating islands of plastic garbage in the ocean.<sup>6</sup>

Even when we realize the problems, acknowledge them, repent/regret them... it's hard to change our ways. Still, it's important to try. It's important for our health, and the health of future generations. It's important because God told us to, and we're just care takers. God is the landlord. As it says in Psalm 24 (and elsewhere), "*The earth is the Lord's and all that is in it, the world, and those who live in it.*" Treating the world without this respect is, as Wendell Berry puts it, blasphemy. Our own health and not making God mad are good reasons to try, but there's more. There's love.

"For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son."<sup>7</sup> God loves us and we are special, but God also loves The World. All of it is good... even mosquitoes & poison ivy. Accepting God's love for us, and the whole of creation, is a great reason to try and make a difference.

#### And there's hope.

I heard a scientist remembering back to the fears of acid rain in the 80s. Climate change deniers will use acid rain as an example of how scientists scare everyone with predictions that never come true. This scientist showed the opposite. That when

societies and their governments take action, we can bring healing. A more recent example of change is the start of COVID. Pollution in the atmosphere noticeably declined when people stopped driving to work. We can make a difference and take care of creation.

We're also not alone. Nature is designed to cleans itself though the demands are too high. Above that are reminders in the Bible, such as in Colossians (1:19-20) where Jesus is described, "For in him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, and through him God was pleased to reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, by making peace through the blood of his cross." Jesus is not just helping us, but all of creation.

So, we need to remember that we are made from the same basic dirt that everything else is. We can remember Wendell Berry's words that "We are holy creatures living among other holy creatures in a world that is holy."

We also need to remember that we are special. We can work together in small ways, and advocate for large changes, that will help us both till (use) and keep creation. We can pray to be able to help Jesus bring healing and love to the world.

## ✤ Spirit Sightings

Because is Earth Day weekend, I went looking for Climate related Spirit sightings.

Rev. Peter Rombeek Kensington Presbyterian Church St. Luke's in Annapolis was on long 5 acres of land leading to the river. They decided to convert the parts that didn't have buildings on it (about 4 acres) back to it's natural marshiness. This helps in a variety of ways. It is better at absorbing Carbon Dioxide. It helped filter the water before it got to the river - and to absorb water from the river when it floods (which it does a lot more than it used to).



St. Paul's is nestled feet from the Pamlico River in Aurora, N.C. The town has been hit by two major floods in the last decade - cause a number of people to leave, and reducing the congregation to 6 people. That isn't stopping them from trying to bring healing to the world. In this case it's through creating opportunities for conversations about climate change to happen, and finding resources to help their neighbours.



#### In Malawi, poor, overused soil and low rainfall have made it difficult for Elena to farm her fields. As a single mother, Elena is the breadwinner of her family. A healthy crop yield is essential to her livelihood and being able to provide for them, so **Elena decided to participate in a Presbyterian**



World Service & Development-supported project, which taught farmers conservation agriculture techniques to conserve and improve their soil and better retain moisture. "My yields improved immediately in the second season. I plan to extend the cultivation area with the manure application and hope to have a good crop stand. This will increase access to food for my family and to financial resources to cater to other basic household needs," said Elena. Today, she teaches fellow farmers in her community about the benefits of conservation agriculture.

**Wednesday, April 26** We pray for the people, ministries and mission of the Presbytery of Kingston in Ontario.


**Thursday, April 27** We pray for the people who gather and serve at Edmonton Urban Native Ministry in Alberta, and we give thanks for their ministry.


