


Prayer for Illumination

Sermon: Living with a preposterous God

Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts. Amen.

Wonder. It's something we've all experienced. Now, I'm not talking about when you wonder *about* something, but when you are fascinated/amazed with something that stuns you into staying in the moment. This wonder then sends your thoughts soaring in a new direction - until they come back down to earth.

All sorts of things can inspire wonder. What catches your attention? I never get tired of sunsets. Babies nurture wonder in (almost) everyone. It doesn't even matter what species. They could be puppies, or ducklings. Human babies can be mesmerizing.

This wonder from children helps us to have them - though this can be complicated. If you have them young, then you'll have the energy to get through the sleep deprivation to keep up with them - but they cost a lot. If you wait until you can afford a child, then you probably have a career under way. It's also not as easy to become pregnant. If you hope for a child, but can't have one, it is a bit like having a wonder taken away from you. It can be demoralizing. You're willing to try all sorts of things to embrace this wonder.

We don't know why Sarah and Abraham didn't have kids when they were young. We don't meet them until they're in their seventies<sup>5</sup> We know enough about their culture from the Bible, and looking at similar cultures elsewhere, to know that Sarah would have felt like she had let down her part of the marriage. She would have been ashamed.

I'll bet she wondered why she hadn't had children. She's not alone. People still wonder this. I have friends who would make excellent parents, but aren't able to have children.. They wondered why not. So have quite a number of other couples I've listened to. I'm sure you've heard similar questions, if not experienced this yourself.

This question leads to the more general question about God's timing. I'm sure you've wondered this. Why did someone lose their job as inflation is hitting? Why did someone get sick just as they were retiring? The timing question doesn't always come from something bad, but we can spin it. We know people who have been healed from a deadly illness... but ask why, if God will heal them, did they have to live so long in pain?

It's okay to ask these questions.

They show a desire to know God.

Like the situations, there isn't one easy answer - and none of them help in the moment of pain that gives birth to the questions.

One painful truth about the world is that evil still exists and works in it. There is evil at work in nature, such as cancer or Parkinson's or dementia. There is evil that happens because of people - such as not cleaning up our pollution, and war. The Bible reminds us that our actions have consequences. After

Abraham hosts the three strangers that are God, they go for a walk. Abraham hears how the city his nephew has settled in (Sodom) is living without respect for others - and so it will be destroyed. Abraham convinces God to give the good people a chance to clear out first. A more recent example could be the use of DDT and its negative effect on pregnancies and babies. Sometimes bad things happen, and sometimes people do things that break relationships - and this has consequences.

Sometimes things don't happen as we want them to because God is directing it. A good demonstration of this is when a parent sees the child reaching for the glowing red burner on a stove they yell and slap the hand away. The child is hurt and scared, but not as much as if they'd touched the burner. Some situations are just evil, but others may be God protecting us from something worse.


Then there's Paul's advice. Like most advice in a bad situation, it's pretty bad in the moment. It does help to remember that Paul experienced both some form of personal, probably physical, hardship he only hinted at - and was locked up many times. He knew about hardship. Paul shares that his affliction forced him to push through the problems, which helped him to trust God and learn that he could get through hard and painful experiences, which gives him hope when things are bad... and reminds him that in all things - God's Spirit pours love.

Telling someone, 'hey, pain makes you stronger' is a good way to get a slap. But when it's possible to look at the journey with hindsight - it can be possible to see the love and to find hope. It reminds me of a message I heard repeated on the Seminary field trip to Cuba. 'Cuba had been in tough times before and got through it. We'll get through this.' (I'm curious what they are saying now.)

There are times when we wonder why. Sometimes it's just evil,

sometimes it's God with some plan we don't understand, and sometimes we even figure it out with hindsight.



But in the moment... sometimes the only thing we can do is laugh - which is what Sarah did. It's possible she laughed out of joy, but considering her comments about being past menopause... I think she laughed at the preposterous timing of God.

Which, I believe, is characteristic of God that keeps coming up: being preposterous. Oxford defines it as: "completely unreasonable, especially in a way that is shocking or annoying."

Thinking of Abraham and Sarah. There's the preposterous suggestion we heard last week that they should lead their household away from family and into a nomadic life-style... when they were in their seventies. That said, it worked out.

When Abraham first heard God's promise that he & Sarah would give birth to a great nation... he laughed so hard he fell on

his face (Genesis 17:17). Sarah manages a bit more dignity with her laughter, but still, God's suggestion is preposterous. That said, it's a good thing God promised them. They would have been hoping for a child, especially a son, for more decades than they can remember. It would take a miracle to happen now. The idea was preposterous ...yet, it happened.

Sometimes God coming is preposterously ordinary. Like when Abraham was having a siesta and God walked past like three ordinary people. If God looks ordinary, how are we supposed to recognize the divine? Who do we treat as God? What do we offer them? How do we listen to these possibly ordinary, possibly divine, people? It's completely unreasonable, preposterous, of God to expect this of us ...yet it happens.

Sometimes God combines the miraculous and the ordinary. Take a baby for example - any baby. Every one is a wonder. ...and then there was Jesus. God coming as an ordinary baby. That's preposterous.

Living is complicated. It can be hard and with unreasonable suffering. Living with a God that has a tendency to be preposterous can be annoying. But the shocking aspect of God's unreasonableness can open us to new possibilities, and bring us unexpected (impossible) opportunities to experience wonder.

So, keep a look back, look around, and look ahead for the glory of God.

Prayer: ...that we might see God in all things.


Mailing a cheque or signing up for Pre-Authorized Remittance (PAR) are also good options.

often out of fear.


We pray that you may open us like you opened the tomb on Easter morning.
