Intro to the readings

- What would it take to get you to move to another country? Think about that as you hear about Abram
 - Abram = Abraham Sarai = Sarah Lot is Abram's nephew
- A few words before our psalm
 - fear: this isn't quite like fightened but more along the lines of standing on a cliff with a really amazing view - and having a healthy respect for the power of gravity. Everything is good, but if you step out of line you can't fight the power.
 - Righteousness: living God's way right with God.
 - Justice: can mean legal rights, but often means living in a right relationship with God and others

Sermon: Sing a psalm

Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts. Amen.

My first career type job was teaching intermediate grades at a Christian school in Toronto's China-Town. We'd start the day with a prayer and current events. One day I told them about an event in which a teen from our neighbourhood was frustrated with all the restrictions about living at home - something they could all relate too. Apparently he'd told his father how fed up he was, which was shocking. More than that, the son had told the father he wished the father was dead so he could finally do what he wanted. His father said "okay", and surprisingly gave him money. It was when the son was on his way to the casinos in Niagra that one of the students called out, "Hey, I know this story. It's from the Bible." He was right; I'd just shifted the context and let them believe it was a 'current event'. Together we figured out modern details to continue the story of the Prodigal Son.

This is a good exercise to do - figuring out how you would tell a Biblical story. And it doesn't need to be a parable. You can retell any part of the Bible. You 'just' need to read it through slowly. Figure out what's going on - not just the events, but also the issues behind them. For example, in the story of the Prodigal Son - asking for his share of the inheritance isn't just asking for

some money, it's saying he wishes the father was dead. In a society based on family honour... this was unbelievably shocking.



Prodigal Son - Fr Sieger Koder

Let's go on a similar journey with Psalm 33. I'm going to use words, being a sermon, but you could use painting, or dancing, or music, or a meal - however your imagination works.

The psalm starts with rejoicing. Joy is nice, but why show it? If I were writing it I'd explore the why first... so we'll come back to joy later.

Next, the psalm explores why we should rejoice. What would you say? Why are you glad God's around? How do you experience God?

In talking with you all on various occasions, I can guess some of the answers. You've told me about how God is there when you need support, or when you are lonely. Related to this is the comfort of knowing you are loved - always and anyways. Another common theme is just how amazing God is. Some examples you give include: creation (flowers, starry nights, gravity, people, strawberry ice cream, ...). So, God the creator, but also wonderful is God the Son - the life (and death, and return) of Jesus. And then there's God the Spirit - those times you feel God's presence/influence... which is amazing. Some of you talk about how it's a comfort knowing a good way to live - and that these values/rules & examples do help make your relationships better... even if they can be challenging to live all the time.

What would you include if you were rewriting this psalm? ...

Psalm 33 sings that the LORD is faithful. We are reminded of God's awesome power in creation - and that creation is full of love - "the steadfast love of the LORD." As part of describing God, and celebrating God, the psalm reminds us of God's love for righteousness - for people to live in healthy relationships for all. God has values that help us to collectively become the most beautiful we can be - and loves it when we live this way.

The psalmist then reflects on what this means for us. The word 'fear' is used... which is less frightened and more of a healthy respect for something much more powerful than you. This power is more than being able to control the elements, or create life... it is also supreme wisdom - a wisdom that is so much better than ours.

...which is easy to say and hard to live.

Take the example of Abram. He's well on in years, when God invites him to leave his home & family, and move to an unknown destination. Is there anything about that that sounds wise?

Another example... this week I was asked about what Jesus meant by "the first shall be last, and the last first." How does that make any sense? How is this wisdom? Well, it depends on your goals. Is it about having security in your life, or about helping people who need it to have a share? Jesus goes out of his way to help the sick - those who would normally be last. He even takes on a role that would be below that of a servant, washing people's feet, to show how the Son of God went from first to last. How would you show God's wisdom in your psalm?

Psalm 33 shows the opposite - people trying to create their own security/safety. The psalm gives some examples that are still around - armies and tools adapted for war. The psalmist mentions the horse, but we might mention airplanes or explosives. A warrior's strength is another example. Today people still strive for physical strength to show control. Another way is to put their faith in finances. In the end, when someone lives by their own wisdom they will lose - and damage everyone in the process.

We can all think of people who make their own choices that end up hurting themselves or others. If you were rewriting this psalm, would you include one of them? or would you include a more personal challenge - because there are times when we are tempted to work for ourselves rather than turn to God.

Because our society focuses on individuals, it's important to include that, but also remember that psalm 33 talks of nations. We still live as a community. Together we make wise, and unwise, choices. Do we take responsibility for that?

There is hope, which is how the psalm ends. When we all look to God for the wisdom of how to live together, then we survive together - and experience God's steadfast love.

How would you include hope? Perhaps as a story?

Rose will tell us more about General Assembly, the national meeting of the Presbytery Church in Canada, but I'm going to share a story I saw. They took time away from the reports to encourage people to share about where they see growth happening. One example was of a church in Burnaby. When talking to the local school, they found out that the children who depended on the breakfast and lunch program had no support during the summer. The congregation was moved to find community partners and start a food program to support those families. Where do you see hope? What could you share?



Would you end with hope? It's a good place. With hope we can imagine a better future. It gives us energy. It helps us live in a way that embraces the solid love of God.

That's all great, but with this hope I feel joy rushing to the surface. My senses become more aware. I want to express it by making music - ideally with others.

How do you experience joy? What's it feel like? How do you show it? How do you celebrate what brings you joy? ...If you were writing the psalm, how would you express your joy in God?

Perhaps this week you can take up the challenge in verse 3. "Sing to the Lord a new song." Would you include everything Psalm 33 does? What is great about God; how we fail to follow God's ways; where we see hope; and the invitation to rejoice in the Lord. How would you express yourself - and our God?

We thank you for the meeting of General Assembly, for the work of our church in Canada & around the world, and pray for that in the coming year more seeds of hope will bloom...


We pray for our neighbouring congregation of Taiwanese Robert-Campbell as they start a new song with the Rev. Bien Chung... And we pray for Kensington...

In Jesus name Amen.





MISSION MOMENT

Prema and her five children live in the Umerkot district of Pakistan. After her husband's death. Prema found it very difficult to provide for her family, and severe drought throughout the district only brought more hardship. Her eldest son tried hard to find work so that he could help support his mother and siblings, but despite his best efforts, his job prospects were limited due to a physical disability. A glimmer of hope came when Prema and her family were selected for a food assistance project run by Presbyterian World Service & Development's local partner. The food aid that Prema's family has received through the project has helped them to become more resilient to future adverse events.
