✤ Intro to the readings

- Psalm 136. Curiously, it doesn't appear in the three year lectionary. Possibly because it is quite repetitive, however that ties in well to our passage from Ephesians.
- Today is the last in our series with Ephesians. There's more to it, and I suggest your read it. When you get to the bit that seems like marriage advice, remember that that's not what it is. Instead it's an attempt to describe our relationship with God with a relationship everyone knew like when we describe God as Father. Earthly fathers have faults, so do earthly institutions and relationships. God is glorious.
  - As I wrote in the email invite, today's passage from Ephesians is inspirational. There's a lot in it, but try to just go with the flow this time. Let it nourish you. I do encourage you to spend more time with it this week.

Sermon: More than you can imagine Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts. Amen.

I don't know about you, but for me the best description of this passage from Ephesians is, "Wow". It's quite a prayer.

Is this what your prayers are like when you pray for someone? or for yourself? Personally, I tend to focus more on the tangible - naming specific issues that people are dealing with: health, safe travels, relationships, justice, etc. While I don't get too specific when we're being broadcast on YouTube, you are in my prayers.

This passage feels like a prayer that goes beneath these real concerns. How would you feel if you knew someone was praying this passage for you? That...

- you would be strengthened in your inner being by the power of the Spirit;
- that Christ would dwell in your heart
- that you would be rooted and grounded in a love that is too big to understand - surpassing knowledge, and even our imagination!

How does that make you feel?

I find it takes the focus away from me and gives me a vision of God that is... mind-blowing. I love that this passage both stretches our concept of God, and touches us personally. It is a prayer for God to be tangible in our lives. It's a reminder, building on the earlier parts of the letter, that working on this foundational relationship will help all aspects of everyone's lives.

> This part of the prayer starts with our *"inner being"*. Psychologists would like this. Whether you think of your inner being as your feelings or subconscious, it has a big influence on how you see the world - and react to it. Imagine having the Spirit strengthening your inner being. Imagine having Christ dwelling in your heart. This is the prayer. This is what God wants.

This is a different image than a lamb following Jesus the Shepherd. It's not simply doing what you're told, or trying to be like God, but this is living with Christ. I suspect you've all lived with someone at some time. It can be great when it works well, but it takes work. There's a give and take and it's not all about you.

I remember a friend of mine getting married and moving into her husband's house. She told me how gracious it was when her new husband didn't try and keep his house the way he'd carefully made it, but intentionally worked with her so that it would be their home. The idea of Christ dwelling in our hearts is comforting. Do we invite God in as a distinguished guest, or as a room-mate? There's a big difference. Do we allow our inner being to change so that Christ can live there?

Letting Christ live with us will root us in God's love. We've all experienced types of love before. They are like God's love, but not as... lovely. Letting Christ live in you will help you be like a tree

planted by the water, whose roots never fail to bring nourishment. The nourishment your roots bring in will give you strength to help deal with those issues I normally pray for: health, travels, relationships, justice, etc. This is a practical/tangible prayer.

After praying for our "*inner being*", the prayer shifts to our "*power to comprehend*" - our mind. This is something Presbyterians traditionally take pride in. The prayer is that we might be able to grasp "the breadth and length and height and depth" of God's love. Why does this need prayer? Because God's love is so big. Rich Mullins, a songwriter who wondered deeply, wrote about God being too big for telescopes, and too small for microscopes, and too close to see (like an ocean for a fish).<sup>4</sup> "The love of Christ surpasses knowledge".

Part of this means it's too big to wrap our mind around. So how do we do it? We have to resort to experiencing it. To allowing God to love us deeply - and responding. Love is one of those commodities that the more you use it, the more there is. God knows it can hurt to love deeply (Jesus was crucified), but the more deeply we allow ourselves to experience love, the more we can grasp the breadth, length, height and depth of God's love. While we can't wrap our minds around God, we can get a sense of how big God's love is.

Another aspect of God's love surpassing knowledge is that it won't always make sense. This shouldn't come as a surprise. As much as evolutionary biologists try to have a reason for everything, we all know from experience that love often don't make sense. I'm sure you can come up with some examples of romantic love that doesn't make sense - and this reflects some of the depth of God's love for us. I'd like to share some examples of non-romantic love that also don't make sense.

- Albert Schweitzer could have had a very comfortable life in Germany as an organist, or minister, or theologian. He was successful in each of these. Instead, he felt there was more need for doctors in Africa. He showed God's deep love by giving up a life that made sense to retrain and build a hospital in a jungle.
- On a smaller scale, but still important, I read this week about a Theologian giving a talk at a university. On the campus tour he saw a young man with a young woman. They stood out because he was 6'8"... and she was 3'3". He watched as he gently picked her up and gave her a kiss on the cheek. The Dean giving the tour explained that the man had given up basketball scholarships from prestigious school to come here because this was the school that also offered a scholarship to his sister. The Theologian shared his admiration with the young man. He replied by saying, "Those of us God made 6'8" need to watch out for those he made 3'3". It's a nice answer, and it shows the deep love of God that doesn't make sense.
- Another example of love that is bigger than we can understand are the stories out of the South African Truth & Reconciliation Commission. This process allowed people to escape justice by admitting to what they did, listening to their victims, and agreeing to reparations. While Bishop Tutu expressed his disappointment that the government didn't follow up on the recommendations, it did force the country to admit to what had happened and it brought some healing. In a case I read this week a woman forgave the man who roasted her son and husband on a spit. She asked him to collect the ashes so she could bury them, and to come to her house once a month because he seemed to need a mother. She wanted him to

know that she forgave him and loved him - because God does. This is a deep love that is more than we can ask or imagine.

Which is how this powerful passage ends; that God "who by the power at work within us is able to accomplish far more than all we can ask or imagine." The letter to the Ephesians starts by praising God for being amazing, and for offering us salvation. It then admits that we need it, and only God can change us - save us. And that this isn't just for the chosen people, but everyone who accepts. The letter will go on to consider how we can live into this wonderful gift. Before that is today's passage that reminds us of how God's love is bigger than we can comprehend... and that it is at work within us.

This mighty love is at work in you and me. I believe it's at work in everyone... though some people don't want to risk loving deeply, or have been hurt and need healing, or want lives they can comprehend. Despite that (or because of that) God's love, that can accomplish abundantly more than all we can ask or imagine, is at work within us.

What does that thought do to your prayers? Do you try to be realistic? Are you cautious so you won't be let down (a valid concern)? What if we go back to the basics and pray that the Spirit will strengthen our inner being; that Christ will dwell in our hearts; that we might comprehend the breadth and length and height and depth that is the love of God - so that we might be filled with God.

Imagine what life would be like and pray.

### 🔆 Spirit Sightings

This week I heard two stories that start in Food banks. Both were from people who never imagined being food insecure.

The first story was somebody who was feeling very defeated by their situation. An eccentric stranger plopped their bags down in front, made eye contact and said, "It will get better." Defying the imagination, these words penetrated and hope grew... and the person's life did get better.

In the other situation Tony Colley unexpectedly found himself out of work. He found a part-time job with a caterer and was surprised by the amount of unused food. This led to him taking his business experience and starting a company (<u>B12give.ca</u> (Be one to give)) to rescue excess food and redistribute it to places that could use it, such as shelters.

In the first situation, the person definitely recognizes that the Holy Spirit was strengthening their inner being. I don't know what Tony thinks, but this sounds like something is God inspired
