Sermon: God's representatives in the world......Rijke Rombeek Greetings

It is good to be back at Kensington. I have not shared here much, but I know that some of you remember when I shared here previously. At that time I encouraged you to pray for peace. I think prayer is essential to everything we do as servants of God and is part of what changes our actions from good works to ministry.

With that said, let us pray.

Living God, our Creator, our Redeemer and the one who sustains us,

or for the more academically inclined, The New Oxford Study Bible NRSV

we come before you. We pray your blessing upon this time of teaching, challenge our hearts as they need to be challenged and affirm in us where need to continue to stand strong. We are your people Lord, use us that we may see your blessing in the lives of those around us. In the name of your precious son we pray. Amen.

Today I want to encourage you as a faith community in your work as ambassadors of Christ and servants of the living God. I will share from scripture and from my own ministry in Japan.

Because I have become used to 35 minute sermons, I am going to jump right in. 15 to 20 minutes does not feel like enough time to communicate anything anymore.

Being in the image of God

Genesis 1:26-27

We read this earlier, so I won't read it again, but it should be on the PowerPoint to refresh your memory.

I have heard so many theories about the image of God that seem so outlandish and crazy they make my head spin. I have found one explanation recently that is so deceptively simple it is almost unbelievable.

What is an image? An image is an object that calls others to the remembrance of the original. Right near my home in Japan there is huge statue of a Kanon or a bodhisattva, people come every day to offer up prayers. Places of worship will typically have something to remind the people that this space belongs to the one they are there to worship. In Japan there are many statues of gods and Buddhas and animals all over the place to which people bring their prayers. In Canadian churches we have a symbol of the cross as a kind of image to say that in this space we remember God and come together as a community of God.

When God made the earth God included an image to remind people of their creator. To act as the creator God's reminders, or representatives, to all the earth. That image is us, humans are the ones who are God's image on earth.

As I see it, we as humans are created to be God's image, to be the image reminding others of our creator and being God's representatives to the world around us. I would even go as far to say that it is the reason why God created us.

Exodus 20:1-6

There is one God, one God with whom we have relationship with, as the Israelites learned what God had done for them v2-3). We are not to make images, both because we are not to try and represent God as we cannot do that in caved images. 2nd, because that takes away from what we are as humans, we are the image and representatives of God to the world around us. Everything else is a poor substitute at best or something that actually only succeeds in drawing us away from God to worship something other than God and define our identity and worth other than in God.

Called to represent God by being a blessing

Genesis 12:1-3

I often think of Genesis 1-11 as the introduction of the bible and Genesis 12 is actually chapter 1 of the real thing. 1-11 tells about creation, including the important role of humans, then in a breakdown of the God and human relationship the world descends into violence, people hurting people, chaos and division. I see God's call to Abraham, or Abram, as a restart and God saying "be my representatives in this earth, share my blessing among the people"(v2-3) God is calling Abram to be God's image among the people. God calls Abram to go to another land

and people, and Abram did. Some of us are called to go to different countries because there are people there who need God's blessing, such as Abram and even myself. But we are all called to leave ourselves behind so that we can represent God to the people to whom he has sent us.

Sadly, we do not need to look far to know that as humans we have not always been a blessing to others. Historically or even in the present. I know that I have not always been God's blessing to others. Humans have not well represented a loving God.

Ambassadors for Christ

2 Corinthians 5:17-20.

Paul's says we are ambassadors for Christ (v.20) as the community of faith and individual members of it, reconciled to God through Christ and able to be ambassadors in order to reconcile people to God (v18). To bring others the blessings of God because we have received the blessings of God.

Christ, the ambassador to those who supposed to be ambassadors

Philippians 2:1-11

This is a beautiful passage I would love to go through in detail and I would encourage to prayerfully read it at home, even if you think you already know it.

First of all this passage tells us that Jesus came as an ambassador from God so we could see and be reconciled to God. We, the ambassadors, needed an ambassador to reconnect us with the one who made us to be ambassadors. An ambassador who is not connected to the one they are representing will not be a good representative.

Yet Paul goes farther, he tells us what representing God looks like through the life of Christ. A life that enters into human fragility and pain, even up to and including human death. That we might be reconciled to God. The blessing of that reconciliation is that we, in turn, might bless others and aid in their reconciliation.

God came in the likeness of humans so humans could go forth in the likeness of God. A God who understands pain, and not being afraid of it enters into the pain of others to bring healing and reconciliation with the one who made them, made them for the purpose of sharing God's blessing to others.

Ministry in Japan

In Japan my ministry is with the marginalized and the poor. Here is a picture of us as we meet. This group is called Sidewalk Chapel and meets in Yoyogi park in central Tokyo. We meet rain or shine, because we are meeting the homeless and they are outside in all weathers. It is part of meeting them where they are, in the struggles and pain that they have. This is not just true of



Sidewalk chapel, it is true of all my ministries only Sunday church rents a room in a local civic centre for indoor meetings, though that is also for the homeless and poor.

People come to our ministries, first because they are hungry and we offer food. They need food and we have the ability to feed them. Yet, being given a meal a only helps for a little while. Yes, they come back for more food, but it does not take long before they are coming back not just for the food but because we are offering community. They know we are a community of faith and since Japan is less than 1% Christian, it is unlikely they are coming from a Christian background. For the Japanese, community is identity, community is everything and the homeless have lost community and the identity that goes with it. It is one of those intangibles they need to survive, but if we focus too much on food we will miss the underlying need of human connection. They see us and would rather learn about a faith community than to not have a community at all. So they start coming for the possibility of community. Yet they stay because they have found the God who can transform their lives, the one is the centre of the community. They stay because of God, not us, and certainly not food.

Masuda and Yoshino

This is a picture of Mr. Masuda reading scripture for Sidewalk

Chapel. He is in his 60s and has been homeless for many, many years. He first came to Sidewalk Chapel, homeless, tired and hungry. In the Sidewalk Chapel he met a God who loved



him even when he was tired, hungry and without community. His life completely changed. These days, he is still homeless. Yet now he is homeless by a choice he did not have before. He could find a job, find a place to live, but all that continual effort would keep him too busy. As a homeless person he can be full time among the homeless offering the hope and strength of his saviour. It is a hard life. Yet without people like him, people like me would have a much more difficult time connecting with the homeless. He has taken on the identity as the representative of God and of Sidewalk Chapel.

This next picture is a picture of the volunteers of a ministry we have called Lazarus ministry. Where we connect with the homeless and poor outside of Ikebukuro station in Tokyo. One gentleman is named Mr. Yoshino. Middle row, grey haired gentleman next to the wall. He used to own and run a restaurant in Sendai. In 2011 the earthquake and tsunami brought great devastation to many areas including the city of Sendai. He lost his restaurant and his home. He found himself homeless, hungry and tired. He found Lazarus ministries and through Lazarus ministries to Nakayoshi Church through which he found a community and God.

He is now the cook for Lazarus ministries and Nakayoshi

church. While it is not his personality he preaches from time to time, sharing his own story and how he see God in his life. He is one of the most recognized faces among Lazarus ministries and Nakayoshi church, while



he says little, his actions as God's representative are irreplaceable.

Conclusion

It is not our money that brings God's blessing to others, though we may use it to help. It is not our ability to provide material needs that brings God's blessing, for those only last a short time.

Yet, in prayer we can be very intentional about bringing God into the work we do. In prayer we connect with the one who sent us. In prayer we can intentionally connect with the one who redeemed us and has shown us how to be the true image of God. Through prayer we can be better at channelling God's love, hope, peace, strength and even God's transforming power. Because while we do not have the power ourselves, God can bring hope to those who are without hope, peace to those whose lives seem out of control, strength to those who are fragile, the strength of transformation. In prayer we can take the actions anyone can do to being something that connects people to God.

Do you remember the men I mentioned? There are many more people with similar stories. They and many others have found the transforming power of God. It did not make them rich. It did not give them a lot of material blessings. Yet the change was so deep that outer circumstances no longer matter and no longer hold them back. They can give hope and strength because through God's servants they came to know the transforming power of God. They met a God who descended into their pain and suffering and blessed them, changing them from tired and hungry, to people who could be God's representatives bringing blessing to those around them.

Let us pray.

God, our Creator, God our Redeemer, God our Sustainer in all things, we are your people, created in your image. Help us to represent you. Help us to connect people to you. Give us the strength to descend into the darkness of others that your light may shine. As your community of Kensington help us be your image in the NDG and beyond to reconcile people to the God who loves them and wants to bless them. In the name of Christ, crucified and risen we pray.



May it not be long.


May it not be long, Lord, before we feel ourselves directly addressed by your voice and you raise up in us that holy restlessness to get your work done...



SOCIAL ACTION SPOTLIGHT

Vaccine Equity

The COVID-19 pandemic highlights the importance of equitable access to vaccines and medicines for all. Unfortunately, COVID-19 vaccine distribution has been unequal, with more than 75% of COVID-19 vaccine doses having been administered in just 10 countries, while underserved low-income countries have been left vulnerable to new COVID-19 variants. The World Health Organization warns that vaccine inequity threatens our ability to end pandemics and poses a risk to global health security.

The Presbyterian Church in Canada has supported equitable access to vaccines and essential medicines for years, including the Towards a World Without AIDS campaign and advocating for the reform of patent laws that prevent fair and equitable access to vaccines and essential medicines.

It is essential that wealthier countries address the underlying factors contributing to inequitable access to medicines and vaccines, such as systemic racism and economic inequality. To begin, we can support the COVAX initiative, which aims to distribute vaccines fairly to all countries by providing funding to organizations to increase vaccine access for all. We can also advocate that Canada develop vaccine production capacities domestically and set a percentage of all vaccines to go to low-income countries that cannot afford to pay market rates for vaccines and essential medicines.

What can you do?

 Write to your elected representatives to express your support for vaccine equity and urge them to take action. Template letters are online at presbyterian.ca/justice/advocacy.

MISSION MOMENT

Pakistan is the world's third-largest refugee host country, accommodating over a million Afghans who fled their homes due to war, internal conflict, insecurity and persecution. The poorest refugees lack sufficient access to necessities such as food, shelter, clothing and health care. Another need expressed by Afghan refugees is for their children to be able to access schooling. PWS&D is responding to this need by providing a digital learning facility where Afghan refugee children and young women can access virtual education in place of traditional



schools. The Digital Learning Center is one way of supporting those who have already lost so much. It is planting the seeds for current and future success for children and young women who would otherwise be entirely out of school.
