☀ Intro to the readings

Last week we heard about David, the youngest son of a farmer living beside nowhere. David was told he would become king... and after twenty years of life experience it happened. He even managed to unit all twelve tribes. As king, David made good and bad choices. You could easily make a TV show out of it. Through unifying the kingdom, trying to correct his mistakes, writing honest psalms, ...and starting as one with the people, David is remembered as the greatest king they ever had.

He had several wives and sons. The problem with that is that there were different opinions on who should take over. It ended up being Solomon. There's a nice story about him asking God for wisdom, and using that to decide which woman was actually the mother of a baby he threatened to chop him in two. I wonder if the women were some of his (reportedly) 700 wives and 300 concubines. Solomon's most known for his building projects. God turned down David's repeated offers to build a temple which Solomon built. God did remind Solomon of the covenant (ie. serious deal) between God and the people. For Solomon it basically went, 'If you follow me you will be a great king, and so

will your family... <u>but if not</u> it will lead to exile and destruction.' So, Solomon built a great house for God, and a grand house for



himself (palace)... and towns to store his wealth & supplies, ...and various smaller temples for his wives' various gods. To help do this, he imposed heavy taxes, compulsory volunteer labour, and made foreigners living there into slaves. For those who remember history, it's very reminiscent of what the Pharaoh did to the Israelites when they lived in Egypt. As happens to everyone, Solomon died. As happened previously, there were disagreements as to who should take over.

Now, before Solomon died a young man was told by a prophet that he would become the next king, and the current King tried to kill him - which sounds like David and King Saul. This man was named Jeroboam, and he fled to Egypt. From the family, Rehoboam was able to take power. Today we'll hear how about how this third generation started.


Today's reading could be another episode in the exciting period drama 'The Kings'. This week we have a new king selected. His first speech is pretty immature, with bits about torturing people with scorpions and comparing his pinky finger to his father's ...well, a part of the body we don't name in the Bible. There's a much more elegant poetic response, after which Rehoboam runs back to Jerusalem - which is rather ironic considering he had just been boasting about his great strength.

In case you were wondering, there wasn't a civil war - which is pretty miraculous if you remember other nations that have split. Jeroboam became king of the northern Kingdom - Israel. This history, written by those in Jerusalem, doesn't paint him so well, but that's another episode.

There's an obvious lesson here. Listen to your people and serve them. Servant leadership is a common theme in Christianity. You might be tempted to just assume you've heard it before. You're probably right, but don't doze off. We still have things to remember here.

There's a number of good points that come out of this. One is that it doesn't start with the current leadership. This is history repeating itself. The way of being king - the way the kingdom was set up - led to problems. These are systemic problems.

We do well to remember this story when looking at problems now - because history repeats itself. We've all complained about our leaders at some point. Sometimes the problem is their choices. Sometimes the problem is the way things work - ie. the system. Both are valid complaints. I suspect that part of the problem is also that 'The System' encourages only a certain type of person to become a leader - which doesn't provide an opportunity for everyone to have a voice.



Remembering this doesn't create an easy answer, but it reminds us to work both on current problems and the system which fosters them.

How can we do this?

Young King Rehoboam collects some advisors. This is good. First he gathers the older men, then the young men. This isn't bad - though I would have advised they be gathered together... and to include women. An advantage that the older advisors have is that they are more likely to remember the history - which is important if you don't want to repeat previous mistakes. Other than that, I think the older/younger categories are distracting. The big issues are whether to change the system, and how to work together. In today's passage one group doesn't want to change the system; they want their turn basking in glory. The other group suggests that if you want people to listen to you, you need to listen to them. If you want people to work with you, then you need to work with them.

These were big issues before today's story - and ever since. It's pretty easy to come up with examples of people who become leaders so they can have a turn enjoying the power. I wonder if this is Putin's motivation? There's also examples of well intentioned insurrections in which the power corrupts the leaders. Yesterday I read a bit about the destruction in Sudan caused by a civil war between a general and the man who had been his deputy. I don't how well intentioned their motivation

is... but the effect is the destruction & death of many many people's lives. This can all get worse when regimes are transferred to the next generation - such as King David to Solomon to Rehoboam. Those that grow up with privilege tend to

forget what it's like to live as a shepherd struggling every day for your livelihood. It's hard to relate to someone if you haven't walked that mile in their shoes.

It would be different if they listened to people - or rather, if they listened to all the people. It's so tempting, and easy, to just listen to people who will say what we want to hear. As nice as it is, this isn't healthy. God created diversity; this is important.

I wonder what our political system would be like if the cabinet had to include every party elected? What if instead of a vote they had to reach a consensus? (Probably nothing would get done until working together was re-learned.) What if low paid employees had to have a representative on the company board? What if leaders had to live on the mean, or average, income and use public schools and medical care? Would this help with listening? The fear is that nobody would be willing to be a leader. I wonder what God would do if we tried?

That's part of this story too. That God is involved. That the leaders don't follow God, and this leads to the kingdom literally coming apart - and later to both parts being conquered and taken into exile.



Before I wrap up I want to apply this passage to two different situations.

Yesterday was Orange Shirt Day. It helps us remember problems with both 'The System' and leaders. The system was one in which boarding schools were what the wealthy leaders wanted for their children. There was the assumption this was a good thing. There was also the arrogance that their way was best. There were faults in the system, such as inadequate funding and standards - but the whole system was also wrong.

Then there were the leaders. They didn't listen to the people they were leading - in this case the indigenous people living in Canada. There were leaders and teachers involved out of good intentions, but the people were not listened to. They were not respected. This was wrong.

We need to acknowledge the tragedies this caused, and remember the lessons so that we won't repeat it.


The other situation is even more directly about us.

Once upon a time Christianity was respected and churches were leaders in their communities. While most of Canadian society moved on, most churches remained content in their ways. In Québec there was a rebellion against a church that ruled without listening. In both regions, the church as a leader declined to almost none.

God calls us to be a part of our communities - to help shape them. If we want to have influence, then we need to remember the lessons in this passage. We need to listen to the diversity in our communities. This includes different incomes, languages, ages, ethnicities, & religions. If we don't listen, we can't do the next stage - serve. Rehoboam was advised to serve the people, and they would serve him. If we want our community/society to go along with any of our ideas, we need to both listen and serve them.

An example of this? Before Jesus asked anything of anybody he healed them. What healing needs to happen in our communities? Where do people need caring or hope? We can have a role in

shaping life for the better (to be leaders again), but first let's listen and then serve.

[take and drink]





Hummingbird Ministries, one of the Indigenous ministries supported by gifts to Presbyterians Sharing, is committed to bringing peace and healing to Indigenous families living in BC's lower mainland. Led by The Rev. Mary Fontaine, Moderator of the 2023 General Assembly, the ministry helps to restore hope by offering regular healing circles, working with the community in art and celebration, and providing educational and healing workshops, Bible studies, children's art and music programs. The ministry has also recently embarked on a journey to gather the wisdom and teachings of Indigenous elders through a series of interviews, reviving and



preserving their treasured stories for generations to come.

DAILY PRAYERS

Sunday, October 1 (World Communion Sunday) We give thanks for the global Christian community and all those who gather around the Lord's Table on this World Communion Sunday.

Monday, October 2 We give thanks for the staff and faculty of our theological schools. We pray that God will nurture grace, wisdom and energy in them as they seek to follow God's leading in times of enormous change and challenge.

Tuesday, October 3 We pray for those who serve partner churches outside of Canada.

Wednesday, October 4 (Sisters in Spirit) We pray for Indigenous girls and women who have faced terrible levels of violence and for the families and friends seeking justice for murdered and missing Indigenous women and girls.

Thursday, October 5 We pray for the Rev. Harry Currie, serving as synod clerk for Alberta and the Northwest.

Friday, October 6 We pray for ministers and other professional church workers who are on long term disability.

Saturday, October 7 We pray for Anamiewigummig Fellowship Centre in Kenora, Ontario, as it provides an urban "home" for elders and young people who have endured the residential school system or have aged out of the child welfare system.
