🔆 Intro to the readings

As we go through the Narative Lectionary we've heard about celebrations and the joy of living out God's plans or dreams - and or how things get messy when people don't. Today we will hear from the prophet Isaiah. Scholars believe this part was written before the exile - ie. while Judea and Israel were not respecting God, and how this was not going to be good. Isaiah uses the image of a grape vine, which works well for gardeners. Can you think of another image?

The psalms echo this theme.

Reading: Please look up the passages in your own

Bible,⁵ or click on the name to be taken to an online version. <u>Psalm 80</u>: 8-19 <u>Isaiah 5</u>: 1-7 <u>Isaiah 11</u>: 1-5 <u>Psalm 72</u>

Sermon: What king of God? Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts. Amen. Fall is definitely here. We've got rain, cool temperatures, and less daylight. For those with gardens, it's time to think about prepping them for winter. There's different advice on how to prepare gardens for the future. Many people put bags of trimmings out for the city to disappear. One of my neighbours says to just leave it alone until spring. Others suggest cutting things back and putting the cuttings around the base of the plant to provide insulation and decompose. This cutting down and decomposing feels odd. We had the hope they would be beautiful and fruitful ... and then cutting those parts of the plant off. I imagine if I were the plant getting pruned - I'd probably feel like a failure.

Failures definitely happen. I can think of a number of things I've attempted that failed. I remember organizing a Lectio Divina (reflective) Bible Study that involved creating something artistic. It was wonderful - in theory, and flopped in practice. I was left wondering what I could have done differently. Why had it not worked as I'd dreamed?

I remember at the start of the pandemic looking for ways to nurture our community. I offered an online study group and a coffee time. This worked in other congregations - but here they failed. I was left wondering what I could have done differently. Why had it not worked as I'd dreamed?

As part of my work in the Presbytery I'm talking with congregations who are looking to sell their building to maintain their life. They are wondering if they are a failure. What could they have done differently? Why had it not worked as they'd dreamed?

We've all experienced failure. Some of us try to forget and push on, some get stuck in the failure and self-doubt, and some reflect and adapt. In all cases, failure is messy and hurts.

Last week we talked about how we feel anger - and so does God (or rather, God feels anger, and so do we). This week our passage reminds us that God's dreams can fail.

God has a hope - a dream - a plan. When God gave birth to creation, there was a dream of a wonderful life for all. This didn't work out. Then God had a plan to work with a group of people who would show everyone how amazing life can be if you just live the right way. Everyone would experience justice and rightness - if they just had the 'fear of the Lord' (ie. respected Embodying and followed God). Except this too failed.

God wonders what could have been done differently. Within the metaphor of gardening, God considers how everything was prepared so that they would have an easy life. The best people were chosen. Watchtowers, such as the ten commandments, were given so they could look out for dangerous ways. What grew? rotten grapes. (The Hebrew here is even stronger and suggests 'evil'- evil grapes.)

Why did this plan fail?

The grapes/people didn't look to God for their nutrients. They didn't follow the right way (the righteous way).

Why not?

Greed, selfishness & pride are some common reasons for the failure (all addressed in the Ten Commandments - as is being powerless.

I wonder if insecurity is underneath these reasons. Almost everybody was poor, and the income gap was huge. It can be easy to feel powerless to change things - which can kill hope and increase insecurity. They were living in unstable times. This brought news that the world is falling apart. Then there's more personal failures. We can try and forget it, or get stuck in this failure of goodness, or look to someone who appears successful for inspiration. In their case, the Egyptians and Assyrians were the successful people. In our case, there's intentional marketing of products & lifestyles; the peer pressure from comparing ourselves to our neighbour. Does this help bring love and hope to the world?

Feeling insecurity can lead to chasing after nice things, or status, or honour - rather than after God. The problem is that it's impossible to catch up for long - there's always more to chase.

Insecurity also saps hope from the future. We worry about what may hit us and squire things away. This isn't just like my grandmother keeping months of tinned food in the basement. This includes emotions. It is harder to share. It's tempting to hibernate so we don't get exposed to whatever is harsh outside our cave.

Sadly, insecurity leads to people not living true to who they were created to be. We can worry more about an important life than one that uses the talents/gifts that God gave them. We can bury ourselves instead of risking new opportunities. We try so much, except taking the hand of God who will help us into that dream of a wonderful life.

In our passage, God seems to be asking 'What could I have done differently?' and 'Why did this fail?' ...but this isn't the end. It's easy to see the world is messed up. There's wars and suffering all over the news. Has God not learned yet how to make things right? Has God gone away and hid, or become stuck in the failure?

No.

I don't believe so. I think God has too much imagination, respect & hope for that.

This imagination allows God to look at the state of the world and see what it could grow into - what spring will be like.

Pruning will be needed - which is painful, especially if what is cut grew well in the past. Decomposition is needed to provide nutrients for new life - and new life will come.

God will do this with respect.

An impact of God's respect is that we can make choices. Some of the choices will make God angry, but they will be respected. And, as we heard last week, God continues to love.

Choices aren't blind. We have watchtowers, like the Bible, with good and bad examples - hurtful behaviour and life giving love. People are sent to remind us - from the prophets of old to authors, leaders & friends now. And the Holy Spirit pokes and encourages us. God hopes that when the soil is right, these seeds will grow - that we will also make respectful choices.

There's hope. There are choices that can support the wonderful life God dreams of.

Thinking of the churches that are wondering if they are failures and need to close, I reached out to various experts. One person I was connected with is a minister in Hamilton.⁶ He told



me about a congregation that asked the Presbytery to be dissolved. Instead, the Presbytery suggested that a new congregation be started in their midst. They were able to continue to be looked after, and this new congregation was able to grow in a safe space. The new congregation has changed things, and is once again connecting with the neighbourhood and ministering with families. A seed was planted in a place that felt dead - but had the nutrients for new life.

Thinking of here, I can see community

and relationships growing. What else can we do? Session is looking at how well we are living out our mission statement - and how we can be better at living as "*a Christian community committed to growing in faith and sharing God's gifts of love, hope, and healing.*"⁷ What seeds has God planted that are ready for growing in our soil?

The Bible is full of God being hopeful and reaching out. There are times when the people don't get it and it looks like God's dream has failed - and there are times when people celebrate the light and experience a wonderful life.

I am confident that God is still hopeful - and that God's way will become the way of the word. This will include times when it feels like everything is growing wild. There will be pruning and decay. But God's seeds will grow and bring a wonderful life to all.

World hunger is a more pressing global challenge than ever. An increasing number of people around the world suffer from worsening and chronic food insecurity and malnutrition. Climate change, conflict, and poverty exacerbated by global inflation are key factors worsening this crisis. Hunger threatens physical and mental well-being and hinders social and economic development. Through its partners, PWS&D is responding to the hunger crisis in East Africa, where millions of



people are suffering from increased food insecurity. Conflicts, such as those in Sudan and the Democratic Republic of Congo, are forcing hundreds of thousands of families from their homes. Furthermore, extreme climate weather events across the Horn of Africa have created high hunger levels. Through PWS&D, we are helping to provide emergency support to people affected by the food crisis.


Friday, October 27 We pray for the members of the International Affairs Committee.




