

Listening to God

□ Hymn Sing: a chance to sing people's favourites

Prayer for Illumination Lord, open our hearts and minds through the power of your Holy Spirit, that we may come to know you better. Amen.³



Our main passage is from Hosea. He was a prophet delivering God's message to Israel before they were completely taken over by Assyria. There were a multitude of ways they weren't faithful to God (or each other). The main metaphor in Hosea is that of a marriage with one unfaithful spouse - and the other being faithful anyway.

This passage presents another image. In doing so, it encourages us to consider what image we have for God.

We will read the whole of psalm 107 (which is longer than normal for us). While you'll pick up on the pattern, I encourage you to pay attention to the differences. Is there a section you can relate to?

Sermon: What king of God?

Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts. Amen.

We exist in relationships with other people. (Some people even say we exist to be in relationships.) Some relationships you choselike who to be friends with especially close friends. Others are part of life like your teachers, colleagues, neighbours, ...and family. You can choose if you become friends with these people, but they will be a part of your life regardless.

In any relationship, it's a good idea to know what the person is like. What interests do they have - and what you'd enjoy together? What makes them grumpy or angry or laugh out-loud? How can they help you out - by knowing things, fixing things, listening, or even pushing you to be better? How can you help them?

Not knowing about someone leads to surprises. They can be positive. This week I heard about a neighbour who showed up

out of the blue and offered to visit someone's cat. It was unexpected, kind, and appreciated. Not knowing someone can also lead to misunderstandings and hurting each other. When I moved to Germany I learned that being a minute late was interpreted as not caring, which wasn't the intent.

Of course, relationships are not quite that black and white. The point is that if you have a good idea of who someone is you will have a better relationship.

The same is true with God.

So, what is God like?

There are many opinions, and they lead to different expectations and relationships.

- Some people feel that, if God even exists, God is a passive old man watching the world go round. This leads people not to care about God.
- Some people look at Bible passages about conquest, and the destructive actions of people who represent God - and they turn away.
- Some people focus on the judgment passages in the Bible.
 This leads to concern for following the rules and concern about helping others not end up in hell.
- Some recognize that God is the all powerful creator of the universe. This can bring comfort when they struggle. It can also lead to frustration and anger with God at the horrible things that can happen.
- Then there's stories of Jesus, and others, helping the poor and the sick. This encourages them to come to God for help, and can inspire them to try and help too.
- Some people focus on the passages about how God's 'steadfast love endures forever'. This can bring comfort

from knowing they are loved. Other love passages encourage them to love others without any judgement.

Let me share these ideas of what God is like in another way. I came across a poem this week. It starts like this:

God the warrior God the destroyer God the almighty

God the befriender God the tender one God the lover

God the holy one God the angry one God the judge

God, creator of the universe God the mysterious God who knows us by name

What kind of God do we worship? What kind of God do we pray to? What kind of God loves us? Which story of God haunts us?

What do you think God is like?

Do you think of God like Hosea shows in today's passage?

Here we have God as a loving parent. If we think in stereotypes, this is God the mother. She is bending down to feed her child; teaching them to walk; lifting them to her cheek when they need healing; calling them in. Do you think of God as a mother? as the loving mother of others?

Hosea does more than present God as a caring mother. This is a mother who cares deeply. In this description the kids have repeatedly gone and done what they were warned not to - and these choices have consequences. It makes her mad that they didn't listen. She feels 'fierce anger'!

You may not have had children, but I expect you've had people in your life that didn't listen to you - and their choices led to lost opportunities - even to pain and destruction. Personally, I feel regret and frustration. I try to avoid using the word 'anger', but if I'm honest I feel that too. Can you relate? Have you felt anger that your caring is ignored?

Do you think of God like a parent feeling 'fierce anger'?

Do you think of God as emotional? as having deep emotions? I think sometimes, especially Presbyterians, we tend to think of God as beyond emotions - at least the emotions we don't like. We prefer reasoning. Love is okay, even sacrificial love, but anger? A 'fierce anger' at people who aren't listening or living as God believes is best? What's it mean if God has these primal emotions - these human emotions?

It's a reminder that we are created in God's image. We feel

emotions, because God does. We feel love & anger, because God does. We can be intensely hurt, because God can. We can want the other person to suffer, ...and so can God.

God can feel *fierce anger* with people. This includes 'bad guys' - such as people who kill others. It also includes us, because even if you're a 'nice guy' you are still a part of a society that is taking advantage of migrant labourers, sweet shops in the 2/3 world, and sacrificing the environment for our standard of living. We live in a world that encourages us to covet what our neighbours have. Little lies are normal, including denying our emotions.

God feels this anger - and then what? God's "compassion grows warm and tender" and stops her from "coming in wrath". There are consequences to our actions, but God is there to help us learn to walk. The psalm drives this home with various examples of people in trouble, often of their own making. They realize where they are and turn to God - and God helps.



This is another aspect of God having intense primal emotions.
God cares.

You don't get angry if you don't care. Can you relate to that?

It's a good thing to reflect on with your FaithTalk partner. When did you last feel anger? What was it that really bugged you? What do you care about?

Thinking of relationships, I

expect you can think of somebody who has driven you nuts, but that you also love. What did you do? Did you act out of that anger or frustration in a way that broke the relationship?

Hosea reminds us that God doesn't act on the anger. It may have felt like it when the Egyptians tried to make slaves out of the Israelites again... but that was then not taking responsibility for their actions. They chose not to go to God for help, but to Egypt instead. They chose to follow other gods (Baals), not God. This made God angry, but she chose compassion.

This is part of who God is.

What do you think God is like?

God is the creator and will be the judge. People have done and said horrible things in the name of God. Here we are reminded that God is like a mother who cares deeply for her children. She gets frustrated - even fiercely angry - when they don't listen. Her love is stronger - and this is what drives God's actions. God is deeply emotional - and most deeply loving.

To God be all the glory Amen.

Responding to God

FaithTalk: These are some questions for you to discuss with somebody... or many somebodies.

Do what you feel safe (and practice stretching a little). Wonder: How do you feel of God? What sort of god is God?

Values: Why do you value your image of God?

Wonder: Imagine that you encounter someone who has a different idea of God. How can you relate to them in a way that honours God?

Values: What do you think of God having intense emotions? How does that affect your image of God? How does that affect you?

Memories: Share a recent experience of intense emotion (anger, joy, ...). What is it that you care so strongly about to have that intense emotion?

Prayer: ...that you will both get to know God better.

MISSION MOMENT

The hardening of the US sanctions and the global financial crisis are contributing to a shortage of food, fuel, clean water and medicine in Cuba. With partners' support, the Evangelical Seminary of Theology in Matanzas carries on, providing high quality, diversified theological education, and serving the community through diaconal projects. In 2022, the PCC helped improve the infrastructure for hybrid teaching and assisted with the renovation to the library and the Historical Archive. The Rev. 


