Intro to the readings

The first passage is from Matthew. It is part of a whole series of parables that start, "*The Kingdom of Heaven is like...*". Before this is one about somebody planting weeds in with the wheat, and it being left until the harvest - then the weeds are burned. After this are some comparing Heaven to a treasure hidden in a field. One of the ones we'll hear is about bread. Curiously, in the next chapter Jesus feeds over 5000 people with five loaves of bread and two fish... and then twelve baskets are filled with the left-overs.

Our Psalm acknowledges that it's not always easy to live in a good way - but there is help around.



Reading: Please look up the passages in your own Bible,<sup>3</sup> or click on the name to be taken to an online version. <u>Matthew 13</u>: 31-33 <u>Psalm 141</u>

Sermon: What's Heaven like? Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts. Amen.

Imagine you're having coffee with a friend, or out for a walk, and they say, 'So, you go to church. What's Heaven like?' What would you say?

Would you describe the vision in Revelation? "The city wall is built of jasper, while the city is pure gold, clear as glass. <sup>19</sup>The foundations of the wall of the city are adorned with every jewel; .... <sup>21</sup>And

the twelve gates are twelve pearls, each of the gates is a single pearl, and the street of the city is pure gold, transparent as glass."<sup>4</sup>

I remember when I was a child somebody saying he thought Heaven would have rolling hills and steam trains - because he liked steam trains. Others describe Heaven as a place where they will meet their loved ones.

How would you describe Heaven?

All of these describe Heaven as something that we can't connect with now, but hopefully after we die - or at the end of this world. There are Biblical reasons to talk of Heaven that way.

...and there's passages like today's.

Heaven is like a mustard seed that is planted in a field, or yeast that is hidden in the flower. This is a very different image from streets of gold.

So, what can we say about Heaven?

It is in ordinary everyday things. In Jesus' day bread was baked everyday. Mustard grew.

Not only is Heaven in the ordinary, but it's accessible. This isn't bread made for the King, backed in the royal oven with special imported ingredients. This is ordinary bread. The same with the mustard seed - this isn't a rare flower, or one that needs a lot of special care. It grows naturally there (and here). Bread and mustard are things people had access to.

One commentator I read this week (Amy-Jill Levine) challenged a number of traditional ways of interpreting these two parables. One of the most popular is how these parables would have shocked the initial audience.

You've probably heard sermons that talk about mustard as a weed or invasive species that the farmer doesn't want. Or of the leaven in the bread as something that would make the audience think of it as unclean. Comparing Heaven to a nasty weed or something that makes food unclean would be shocking - but it's not here. These parables aren't about Heaven as a challenge to the current system. While God frequently challenges how people live, it isn't in these parables. Mustard was thought of by Jews and Romans as a nice flavour to add to food, and as an important health supplement. Jesus does talk about bad weeds being planted in the previous parable, but not in this one. For the bread, it's true that leavened bread was bad for Jews - but only for the week of Passover. The rest of the year they ate bread like everyone else.

It's not that plants and leaven can't be bad, it just doesn't seem to be happening here. Jesus is often about motives, but we can't tell the motives of the seed or leaven. We can see what happens the actions - and it's amazing.

Everyone with a small amount of gardening experience knows that from small seeds come big plants - but here is a plant that provides a home for the "birds of the air". We don't know who the birds are supposed to represent, but we do know that this is more than one, and they have a home.

Do you remember how much 3 portions of flour is? It probably came up in previous sermons on this parable, and in the story of Abraham greeting the three strangers. It's not 3 cups. This isn't a bun she's got in the oven. Three Portions is about 40-60 pounds of flour - enough to feed a hundred people. This is either a ridiculous amount, perhaps Jesus being funny, or an amount that is so generous that everyone can have some ...or both.

Perhaps the point isn't that Heaven is like small things that can

produce big results - but is like something unseen will produce amazing generosity?

Now, if Heaven is something that's hidden around us and produces amazing generosity - such as meeting people's need for a home and daily bread... why don't we see it?

In both parables, the plant and the bread take time to grow. At first you don't notice anything. Then you can start to see a change - especially if you carry on with life and then look back. Regardless, growth is happening.

But doesn't this push Heaven off until the end of things, like the New Jerusalem with streets of gold? Not quite, because it is here now - and there are signs - such as amazing generosity. It's not always visible, but it is here.

Where do you see this sign of Heaven - generosity?

Often when we talk about generosity we talk about financial giving. This is one form. Regular offering given to the church is generous (and necessary) for our ongoing ministry. This year we

were blessed with generous bequests from Ken and Lesley. And financial generosity isn't limited to churches - there's generous support of shelters and food banks, schools and medical research, ...and other places. All of these are generous - and this is not all.

There is generosity with time. This week we had a Session meeting in which several of you gave their evening to helping God's Spirit grow the vision of being a "*Christian community committed to growing in faith and sharing God's gifts of love, hope, and healing.*"<sup>5</sup> This morning we have people volunteering their time to help worship happen - from welcoming as ushers, working the tech, singing in the choir, teaching Sunday school, and providing hospitality after to further connect our community. Many of you volunteer outside the church as well. This is excellent (note: the parables are not set in a religious context.) There are those of you who generously give of your time in more personal ways connecting with others and seeing how they are doing.

And being with others can be generous in more ways than just time. We can be generous in how we are present with them. How much do you put forth your opinion in the expectation that you are right, and how much do you listen? Listening without trying to convert the other can open you to seeing God's world, and perhaps Heaven, in a new way. This is generous. That said, simply listening isn't generous. Consider the other perspective, and what is hidden in it. You also need to honestly share your perspective as well. Balancing honest sharing with listening gives witness to amazing generosity that can happen anywhere and anytime. It can lead to growth in you, and your conversation partner - though relationships often need time to be nurtured into readiness. This opening of yourself to difference, and being honest, is amazing generosity.

These, and others, are ways we can see amazing generosity -

Rev. Peter Rombeek Kensington Presbyterian Church which these parables tell us part of what the Kingdom of Heaven is like.

Does it have to be big? No and yes. I'm reminded of when Jesus sees the widow place her coin in the collection box. She puts in less than everyone else, yet is lifted as an example of generosity. Why? She doesn't give out of her left-overs. She gives out of what God has provided her - with the faith that God will continue to provide. Perhaps she remembers the stories of daily bread given as the Israelites travelled through the desert, or the blessing the strangers gave Abraham and Sarah a child. Perhaps she heard Jesus talk about how God's kingdom may be unseen, but will have lots of space to live & lots of food to eat - more than is needed.



So, your friend turns to you and asks what Heaven is supposed to be like?

You can talk about streets of Gold, that's in the Bible. Heaven is like something amazingly beautiful and precious. But don't overlook the common place; don't forget that it is here, now in unseen places. ... and that there are signs of the amazing ridiculous generosity to come.

To God be all the glory Amen.

Do what you feel safe (and practice stretching a little).


Memories: Share descriptions of Heaven have you heard - from the Bible or otherwise.








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#### Sunday, November 19

#### **MISSION MOMENT**

The friendship between the Rev. Dr. Paul McLean and the Rev. Manias Chang Yu-fa began in 2012 when they first started working together on the Bunun Bible translation project, one of the Indigenous languages in Taiwan. In March 2023, they had just finished finalizing the entire translation when Manias was hospitalized. He passed away three months later.



Although Manias did not live to see the complete Bunun Bible, his family and friends find comfort in knowing that he knew that his translation work of many years was completed before he passed away. We give thanks for faithful servants. Paul receives support from Presbyterians Sharing for his work in Bible Translation.
