



What are some things that make you angry? Does it feel good to be angry? (What do you look like when you're angry?)

We all get angry sometimes. What's important is being able to let go of the anger in a way nobody is hurt more.

This may take courage to forgive the person who made you angry. It will mean telling them why you are angry or hurt. It means letting the anger go and thinking about other things. It means telling the person you forgive them and are not going to think about what they did.

It can be hard.

(This is also true if you are angry with yourself, or even God.)

 Intro to the readings

Luke's gospel starts with a greeting and then gets right into the story... or Zachariah. We'll hear most of it today. While Jesus isn't mentioned, it is about preparing the way for Jesus coming.

🔆 Sermon: Surprise?

Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts. Amen.

Today we are having two worship services! What's with that?

The Worship & Music Committee talked about it. We wondered if people would actually come. What would we miss if we cancelled one? Especially with chances to gather last Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, and tomorrow.

I think what swung the discussion wasn't that this is the fourth Sunday of Advent; it was the comment that "this is what you do on Sunday morning."

You might have a more intense or personal reason to come, but 'just what you do' is a good one. It falls under what we call a 'Christian Practice'. These are ways we practice being a Christian so that when times are dark we have practised looking for the dawn.

Today's passage starts by Zachariah going to church. Now he has a bit more responsibility than you. He was a priest. People now become priests or ministers because they feel that God has called them personally, and the church agrees. This wasn't the case for Zachariah. He was a priest because it's what his family

This was their role in society going back centuries. Whether they feel like it or not, it's just what they do.

We don't know exactly what being a priest involved for him. Some people imagine it meant going to Jerusalem and going behind the curtain to where God lived - possibly a once in a lifetime experience. Others think he was a priest in a community and did this on a regular basis. Either way, Zacharaich was at church that day because it was 'just what he does'.

Being an "old" man, I think it's safe to assume that this is something Zachariah has done before. He knows what to expect. There will be the feeling that this is a special place. (Perhaps you've noticed that about some places. I noticed this on Iona in the 6th century abbey - it just feels closer to God). Then Zachariah will go through the routine - light the incense, pray, go back out & bless the people gathered. He knows what to expect.

Except, this time it wasn't as expected. This time he went to church like normal and something different happened.

It makes a good argument for coming to church just because it's what you do.

This time, God shows up.

Now, we always believe God shows up. This is watered down a bit by the belief that God doesn't live here in the church, but is always with us - always showing up.

Still, sometimes there's a special connection. Sometimes you feel at peace; or something clicks and there's a connection between God and your life. Zachariah receives a pretty clear connection - terrifyingly direct. That God works through the unexpected shouldn't be a surprise - you could even say God being doing the unexpected should be expected. Zachariah will sing and refer to David, the youngest son in a large family with the lowly job of a shepherd who became the greatest king of Judah & Israel. Nobody expected that. Zachariah then remembers Abraham. Thinking of Zachariah & Elizabeth having a baby in their old age, we might also remember Abraham & Sarah - and the time three strangers unexpectedly walked near their camp. Abraham invited them for refreshments, only to discover they were from God... and predicted he & Sarah would have a baby in their old age. In response, Sarah laughed.

If you didn't remember that story, that's okay. I don't think God will take your voice away. Zachariah, the priest, should have remembered it. Maybe he was made silent to give space to remember how God works. ...and losing his voice was unexpected.

As the priest on duty that day, Zachariah was to light the incense, say some prayers, and then return to the people and speak God's blessing. That's what normally happened. There was nothing wrong with it. Except now God was doing something unexpected.

God doing the unexpected is something to keep an eye out for.

and it begs the question... what is God doing?

It's not a question that Zachariah likely asked in the moment. These moments tend to be the person's whole reality. Think of when you encounter God in worship through an unexpected peace or connection. Did you analyze the experience, or just be in it? Still, it's a good question to ask when there's time to ponder it. What is God doing? Well... it's a new chapter in "the way of peace".

It starts with Elizabeth getting some peace - or at least quiet, as Zachariah can't talk. But God is doing more - building a new reality. When Zachariah receives his voice back, we hear more.

Zachariah starts by praising God for what God has already done - promises fulfilled. Zachariah then praises God for promises to come. Like in the past, these promises will become real. These aren't secret promises known only to priests. Everybody knows about the covenant (agreement) between God and the people. God will look after them, and they will only have God.

God showing up to save the people of Judah & Israel is expected. God creating, or re-creating, a new Kingdom/reality on earth is expected. Peace is expected. How God will overturn their enemies ...that's unexpected.

This is the plan. Little baby John will grow up to teach people knowledge of salvation. This is more than just telling them 'it's going to be okay, God will save you.' This involves telling them about the enemies they need saving from... and it's not the Romans. They need saving from the way they live. They need saving because other things are coming between them and God, them and each other. This is the enemy of peace - and unexpected.

What sort of things lead us to sin?

- Fears: It's easy to be afraid we won't have enough. A common one is will we have enough to eat or wear. Do we trust God and others to help, or do we sacrifice them to economically look after ourselves?
- Respect: In Biblical times it was called honour, and it was even more important to your place in society than now. Still, it's easy to find massive houses and million dollar

cars around. Is it about need, or trying to buy respect? How does giving respect for things hurt relationships? encourage sin?

• Justice: is hard. It can be small, like when somebody doesn't seem to be paying attention to what you're saying. You can be hurt and decide not to bother telling them things again. Damaged relationship. Sin. It can be massive, like the quest for justice between Israel and Hamas.

In all these cases there is a lack of trusting God - of placing God first. This damages the relationships with God, and with others, ...with all of creation. This is not the 'way of peace'.

It's not really a surprise. In Biblical times they heard readings from the prophets about looking to God for your needs & justice - and looking after each other. This is their part of the covenant with God. The answer baby John will propose is also expected: forgiveness.

Thankfully God doesn't sit there waiting for us to make the first move. God sends people like John to prepare the way; to remind people about sins - about what hurts relationships. This comes with reminders that we are all God's children - we are all connected. When we do something that hurts someone else, we hurt God. When we hurt creation, we hurt God. ...and God offers forgiveness for those that turn around.

Being forgiven builds trust, and trust in God brings peace that our needs will be looked after.

God's forgiveness also helps us to forgive as well - to re-form relationships. They won't be the same, but there can be healing.

It's hard. It means giving up something. It means trusting.

and we can't force somebody to forgive us, or accept our forgiveness. It can be hard to let go of how we define ourselves whether that's our needs, or need for respect, or pain. It can be hard to accept 'the way of peace'.

I'm going to end with a story.

There were two neighbours out in the country, and they hadn't talked to each other in ...maybe two years. It started over a stray cat. It hung around with of of the them, and then it went over to

the other porch. Whenever they talked they started arguing over that cat - until they quit talking.

A traveller came through looking for work. The one farmer said, "You say you're a carpenter? Well, I got some work for you. You see that house over there, that's my stupid neighbour. You see that ditch, he calls it the creek. He dug it out. If he's going to try and divide us with that, I'd just as soon finish the job. Can you build me a fence so I don't have to look at him again?

The worker replied, "Well, yeah, I could do that. You'd need to invest in a lot more wood, but I can get started with what you have by the barn."

When the man came back from town, he looks out at where his new fence ought to be. That carpenter has built a bridge. out of his wood. and here comes his neighbour. across his bridge. onto his land wearing that goofy smile. and walking up to his truck.

And his neighbour says, "You're a brave man. I didn't think you'd want to speak to me again. I feel like a fool. I'm sorry for building the creek without telling ya. ...and about the cat."

and the man finds himself saying, "Ahh, heck, I knew it was your cat. I'm sorry too."

and so through the unexpected dawns forgiveness and peace.

 - Prayer: ...that we will be open to the unexpected, and that we can say sorry for the ways we sin.


God of love Come Lord Jesus, come. We come to you, confident that you are active, because we have seen you active before.




