

Jesus blesses children - Annie Vallotton

Intro to the readings

Before we get to the gospel reading, let's take a moment to brainstorm what's great about kids. . .

- observant
- like a sponge
- imitate/copy
- know the don't understand, but try to
- vulnerable
- ...

Last week we heard how Jesus is a different kind of Messiah than expected. Yes, he's connected with God in glorious ways, but he is also going to be misunderstood, suffer, killed, ...and rise again.

After coming down from the secret mountain meeting with Moses, Elijah & God, Jesus finds the disciples still don't get it. Some can't heal a boy. Others are arguing about which of them is the greatest. Then they want to shut down anyone not part of their way... and Jesus says to let those who are helping others

continue. Don't do anything that will be a "stumbling-block" to others - especially the vulnerable, ...like children.


Today's passage will include children. Remember that back then children had no rights and were possessions. This doesn't mean they were treated badly, but they were more vulnerable. Jesus will also refer to a camel trying to fit through the eye of a needle. Consider that a camel was probably the biggest animal they had seen, and the eye of a needle the smallest opening. Near the end (verse 28) Peter will explode with a statement. Jesus will respond with two lists. As you follow along, try and see what's different in them.

Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts. Amen.

A man ran up. We don't get any sense the disciples thought he was a threat, but what could they tell?

From the running we can assume he's excited to talk with Jesus? or worried about Jesus leaving before they can talk? Maybe he's desperate to have an answer to his question? Is he worried about dying?

We do know he thinks Jesus is a "good teacher." Jesus takes this greeting as an opportunity to slow things down a bit, perhaps to let the man catch his breath... or perhaps just to let him calm down. Jesus teases a little by pointing out that only God is good... although it could also be a bit of a correction. Some would assume it's a correction by saying not to call humble Jesus "good" when that's only God... but as we're in the know, it could also be a correction not to call Jesus just a "teacher" when he is good - as in, God.

Anyway, Jesus doesn't push this and instead turns to the man's burning question, "what must I do to inherit eternal life?" Jesus mentions the part of the Ten Commandments dealing with relationships between people. The man says he's done this since he was a kid. Neither Calvin nor Luther are impressed by this. John Calvin finds it arrogant, and Martin Luther isn't convinced it's possible. Personally, I can believe he's a good guy (I know lots of good guys). I would also point out to Calvin that the man's humble enough to come to Jesus and ask.

Jesus' response is unique in Mark. "Jesus, looking at him, loved him" It's the only time this gospel refers to Jesus loving an individual. That's pretty positive, but God's love doesn't make

things easy.

Jesus points out the man is missing something from his life. I expect he felt this too, and this is what drove him to Jesus. Jesus tells the man to follow him - give everything away and follow him. Don't worry about the stuff, you'll have what you need - follow.

Everybody was shocked. Being wealthy was generally seen as being blessed by God. The good Jews were like Tevye in *Fiddler on the Roof*. Tevye dreamed of being rich, and having the time to sit at synagogue and discuss the holy books. The wealthy were also expected to be generous in the community - to share their blessings... which is kind-of what Jesus is asking the man to do. Though, as often happens with Jesus, it's so extreme it's radical.

The man went away broken-hearted because this was too big an ask. Giving everything away would make him as vulnerable as, well, a child. He'd have to depend on others, or at least on his Heavenly Father - which is probably the point. There are lots of reasons why children are good models for how to accept the Kingdom of God - but having trust, or faith, is the big one. If you are wealthy; if you are used to having your basic needs met... it's so easy to learn to trust that you can do it. It's usually not even a conscious decision. It's not like you wake up and decide, "oh, I don't need God." You just get used to not thanking God for everything, to not looking to God for direction and provisions. It's so easy to slip into your own patterns and priorities.

How are you at giving thanks to God for everything? How are you at trusting in God to provide whatever is needed?

Jesus realizes it's a big ask, but not impossible - "Everything is possible with God." Which is why you have to trust God.

Are you good at trusting people? It can be hard. Chances are people have let you down, but I pray you've also had people come

through for you. An advantage with people is that it's easier to tell when someone lets you down. With a little reflection, you can also tell when they are trustworthy. It's important to do this, because when someone shows they are trustworthy with the little things, then you can start trusting them with bigger things.

If you have difficulty trusting God, you can do the same thing. Try trusting God with little things - not like a magic genie granting your wishes, but with basic needs. Go to God with an open heart for advice, and try not to impose the answer on God. Over time, reflect on what happens (with you or others) and see how God does.

Jesus not only talks about the difficulty in giving it all to God, but also about the consequences. Your life may move away from your family, but you will gain a new one.

This is also hard. The Friday night movie group saw this in *The Chosen* this week as Nicodemus struggled with giving up his wife, children & grandchildren to follow Jesus. We felt his anguish when he didn't - and Jesus' sorrow. We also saw how Mary Magdalene gained a whole bunch of brothers... which, like any family, wasn't always easy.

Have you ever had to explain to your family why you are doing something they think is crazy - but you think it'll help people know God better? or just improve your relationships?

Perhaps not.

Notice that the encounter between Jesus and the man doesn't happen in isolation. Jesus doesn't ask all of them to sell everything. The disciples were just told to follow, not go and sell everything. They presumably had homes and families to go back to. In those days, this was also like a retirement plan.

Why the difference? Why did this man need to up his game? I

suspect because it was getting in the way of the Commandments that Jesus didn't say - the ones about having a healthy relationship with God. His wealth was getting in the way.

What might be getting in your way?

What might Jesus ask you to give up in order for you to accept God's kingdom - God's reign? How can you live more like a child - a child of God?

To God be all the glory.

Peter: It's just when I think about your stories,

and all your talk

about not being able to serve God and wealth.

You say more about money than you do about prayer!

Jesus: That may be right, Peter.

it's because people would rather hear me talking about spiritual things than about material things.

They'd rather hear a sermon about their souls than a sermon about their shares.

Peter: So do you do it to annoy them?

Jesus: No, Peter.

It's just that more and more I realize that behind a lot of spiritual blindness,

and behind a lot of injustice in the world,

there's a money problem.

And where that's the case,

then it's safer to talk about faith than about finances.

But God's interested in both.

Peter: You should have been a businessman, Jesus.

Jesus: Oh no, Peter ...

that's not my calling.

As regards money, my vocation is not to have any.

In that way I can get close to poor folk and let the rich know

that all their piety and religion doesn't count ... until they put their money where God's mouth is.

Peter: Where 'God's mouth' is? **lesus:** Think about it. Peter.

Now, come on.

I've got other things to discuss with you.

Peter: Like what?

Jesus: Well, we could start with the 'eschatological issue' ...



MISSION MOMENT Sunday, February 18

Two-year-old Moriama Safianu has a congenital deformity linked to hydrocephalus. Born into a poor family in northern Ghana, Moriama faced the heavy burden of social stigma, prompting her parents to keep her indoors to shield her from the community's hurtful judgments. Things changed when she was identified for support during a community survey conducted by a community rehabilitation program. The dedicated staff referred her to the Garu Presbyterian Health Centre for specialized care. The staff at Garu also



worked with Moriama's community to address the stigma she had been facing. Moriama's mother expressed her profound gratitude: "I am immensely thankful to the CBR program and PWS&D for coming to our aid. Thanks to your intervention, Moriama is no longer subjected to stigma from the community members."

DAILY PRAYERS

Sunday, February 18 (Heritage Sunday) On Heritage Sunday, we pray for those who preserve church records.

Monday, February 19 We pray for the Rev. Byungho Kim as he completes his term as the General Secretary of the Korean Christian Church in Japan after 10 years of faithful service.

Saturday, February 24 (Coldest night walks) We pray for all people who face housing insecurity. We pray that governments and decision makers work to remove barriers so that all people have access to affordable, safe and adequate housing.
