
Palm Sunday: Yes it is, but we are overturning the normal/ accepted/expected order of things a little. It will flow nicely.

\* Intro to the readings

Since Christmas we've been going through the Gospel According to Mark. In it Jesus flies into the story, skipping along and sending out ripples wherever he goes. He bounces around to different places like a stone skipping crazily across the lake. Everywhere he touches down sends out ripples - rumours of amazing teachings about God and life - and lives changed with wonderful healings.

With the ripples came questions, hopes, and confusion. Who is Jesus? Does this confidence he has in teaching that even extends to telling demons where to go and forgiving sins... does this show he's the Messiah? The King of kings?

As Jesus moves towards Jerusalem, a wave is going out ahead of him. This swell doesn't push people away, but draws them closer. Some people gather to see him arrive because they've heard the stories and are curious. Some believe, or at least hope, he is the Messiah, and others are probably just following the noise and expecting a good time.

### Opening the Present

So, we've got this present here. It represents a king.

What do you think the people back in Jesus time expected of a king? or to me even more specific, what would they have expected

of the King of kings?

- rich, looking good: nice clothes, etc.
- power
- a connection with David, the greatest King they ever had
- everyone doing what he wants or else
  - including putting all other nations in line by either destroying them or subjugating them under God/Jerusalem.
  - o some expected an army
- shouted out Hosanna which means 'save us' so they expected saving... probably from the Romans, maybe from poverty.
- some expected peace to come between everyone ...even the different groups within Judaism
- some expected an end to all problems.

What would you expect if The Messiah came? if Jesus came again... now?

- grand celebrating in the streets? (a parade?)
- instant peace?
- army of angels?
- unifying the church?
- YouTube blog? or Tweets?
- ...what would you expect the coming of Jesus to be like?

If this present is representing a king - the King of kings, what do we expect to find inside?

We already heard what Jesus did right after his grand entry into the centre of Jewish life (Jerusalem and the Temple). He looked around at everything and went back to Bethany. What sort of Kingly action is that? Is this what anyone expected?

Let's hear what he did the next day.

Sermon: Arrival of the King
It seems that Jesus is the sort of king who can be thorny.
Do you think anyone expected this?

Probably some. Jesus has been challenging those who focus on the proper ways to act and worship God - rather than focusing on motivations and healthy relationships.

And there were those who noticed that Jesus tends to do things in unexpected ways. Take the grand entrance into Jerusalem. John Calvin says it's a little ridiculous - and he's right. Jesus has to borrow a ride. He's got no saddle, so others offer cloaks to sit on. He doesn't have a grand ride either, it's an animal used for serving - for carrying others' burdens.

...which says a lot for the sort of king that Jesus is. Not fancy. Not one to march in, but one to serve. Not one to demand that we do things we can't, but a king who will help us carry our load along the journey.

So... not an army but that doesn't mean no conflict.

Flipping out at the Temple attracted attention. It would have caused confusion and tension. People were used to the idea that they had to go to the Temple to make sacrifices, but now the person who may, or may not be, God's Messiah seems to be saying not to do that. He's challenging the purpose of the Temple - the whole idea of the Temple.

This would upset those who made their living providing the sacrifices, and those who deeply believed that this was how they should respect God. It does talk about it in the Bible.


Yet as much as this was surprising, it shouldn't have been. It's consistent with Jesus teaching that God is with us. God walks with us, like Jesus does: in our cities, and those across the waters;

in our places of worship, and others; in our homes, and others... even those we dislike or despise.

It wasn't even a new concept - their Bible included psalms and messages from the prophets that God doesn't really want sacrifices. There are warnings about looking after aliens, and examples of non-Jews revealing God. The Lord wants people to live in a way that cares/loves God in all ways - including loving all

those God loves... which is everyone. ...and that loving is a relationship that is hard work.

Jesus didn't snap his fingers like a king might. He showed up with, and supported by, those who couldn't afford a donkey - yet it worked out. Jesus removed barriers to God so people focus on living out relationships with love. He didn't do it politely, but with strength - authoritative ...as a king?


