Intro to the readings

We've settled into a pattern with our readings with one longer reading and a psalm. While a longer reading can give too much to talk about in one sermon, it also helps provide the context for what's going on - helping us see a bigger picture. The psalms are full of very real feelings and examples of living with them. Today we'll going to pull a little switch and have the psalm first, because it raises some feelings that you may find answered in the Gospel reading.

Today's Gospel passage carries right on from last week. Just in case you missed it, Jesus has been in Jerusalem a few days and has attracted the attention of important church people. While teaching at the Temple, where debates aren't unusual, these church leaders tried to make Jesus look bad or dangerous for the crowds... except they were the ones who ended up losing face.

One of the experts heard Jesus' answers. Can he succeed where the others failed? or are things not that black and white. . .

Sermon:

Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts. Amen.

I'm sure you've all had to summarize things. Most people will have to do it at work, and definitely at school. We also summarize books and TV shows and experiences for friends. There's the struggle of how do you boil something big down into something short.

My kids aren't teenagers yet, but they still tend to summarize their day in a word. I don't find this very helpful, but the exercise can be.

How would you summarize the Bible in a word?

I think I'd pick 'love'.


I see God's love in the stories of creation - from the goodness & beauty in the Seven Days story⁵ to God being willing to get the divine hands muddy in the Adam story. I see love in God's loyalty to people throughout the Bible. It's not that God is always trying to make their lives easy, but is trying to make lives better. It's also not because the people always return God's love - because many (most?) passages involve people turning their backs on God. This shows both the struggles that are part of a loving relationship,

and the necessary honesty. God speaks harsh words, at least they sound harsh in our society; harsh words as well as words of love. All this is part of a loving relationship.

'Relationship' could be another word to summarize the Bible. I like 'love' better because it's more specific, but love can't exist without relationship.

When Jesus is asked what the greatest commandment or directive is, he responds, "'You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength.' The second is this, 'You shall love your neighbour as yourself.'" This is about relationships - with God and everyone else - relationships that start with loving. We are asked, or tasked, to love God with all our heart, soul, mind & strength. ...and to love others & ourselves, with everyone having been created special by God. ...and I think that loving God also leads to loving others with all our heart, soul, mind & strength.

What's this look like?



it. It's not just a relationship of convenience - perhaps someone who will help you get connections. It's not a relationship because you happen to be neighbours, or you see each other at the Y. If your heart is in it, this is a relationship where you care what happens. You will take calls at awkward times. You put off things you want to do so that you can be there for the other. You will spend time so that it will grow. This applies for people, and for God.

If your heart is in the relationship, then you are emotionally invested. You have a greater risk of being hurt, and experiencing a deeper joy. How easily do you take these risks? What emotions do you feel for God? or Jesus? or the Holy Spirit? (it's normally to relate more to one aspect of God than another).

Jesus invites us to love God and others with all our heart

...and with all our soul.

Soul can be used to talk about that part of us that continues living after our body dies - but I think here it's more about your core - who you are. More than our fingerprints, we are all created unique by God - and who we are at our centre is our soul.

To love with all your soul - this will mean recognizing how God made you and putting who you are into the relationship. It means offering your gifts and your weaknesses, your passions and your fears. Our soul is a gift, and can be a blessing to others - and their souls can be a blessing to you. Loving God with who you are will also be a blessing for God as this is how the world was created.

Loving with all your soul risks your identity being challenged... or even changed. While this is often hard, it can lead to beautiful blossoming - in others, and in yourself, as souls grow.

I think of some magical relationships I have had with people through sharing our souls longing for praising God and making music. This combination took us into a new world that nourished our souls - and those who heard our music.

I think of God's soul revealed in the creation stories: one tells of creating order, the other the messiness of creation. I think of how part of Ines' core is organization - and how she shares this with those she loves... and it is a blessing. ...and how my creative messiness is also a blessing. These combined bless God by helping us love God better, and to love others.

We (including you) are to love with all our heart, soul,

...and mind.

This one Jesus added to the original list from Deuteronomy 6:5. One reason for this is that Biblical Hebrew doesn't have a word for 'mind'. In Biblical Hebrew the 'heart' was home to both emotions and thinking. With Mark being written in Greek, perhaps it was felt the distinction needed to be made in case people started thinking that religion was only about emotions.

We are to love with all our mind. This means thinking things



through. Wrestling with how the Bible was originally intended, and what it means now. Noticing how it is written. What does this teach us about loving God and others both in the big picture summary, and the complexity?

Loving with all our mind also means looking for God outside the Bible - which is why Christianity has driven so much scientific research through the ages. Loving with all our mind means asking questions and discussing possible answers... like Jesus was doing with the scribe in today's passage (although, as they both agreed it wasn't much of a discussion). If you love God, you will ask questions. You will listen & look.

If you love others, you will also ask questions. This is where holding people accountable comes in. If you notice somebody behaving in a way that seems to be hurtful - you try and find a way to respectfully ask why. In listening with your mind, and your heart, your souls (together) might come to a better way.

⁷Perhaps you notice a neighbour who seems never to leave their home. As we were made to be social, to various degrees, you could reach out. In asking and listening you may learn why they stay home - and perhaps you can help provide some support or companionship.

Perhaps you have a friend who has said something hurtfulmaybe even to you. Again, you could use your mind to think of

reasons, and ask questions. You can include your heart in listening to what might be behind what they say... and ask more questions. This loving with your mind and heart won't undo the hurt, but may bring healing to the relationship.

Loving with all your heart, soul & mind can be hard; it requires also loving with all your

...strength.

Occasionally this might mean physical strength - such as helping someone move. More likely it involves tenacity - not quitting; loving God and others when society, or family, or your boss don't understand, think you're being stupid, or even don't want to allow you to do what is loving. It can be big things, like Rosa Parks taking on systemic racism, or small things, like respecting your body when going past the bakery - because when you love your neighbour as yourself... you have to love yourself too. You can have a croissant, because God created amazing flavours and taste buds to use, but also look after the body God gave you. Part of loving someone is respecting what they give you... even when others around you make different and tempting choices. This love takes strength, as can the bigger issues like loving those created by God whom society, or even you, don't like.

When loving yourself, remember that it's about appreciating and respecting yourself as one of God's precious children. This isn't about trying to be the favourite child - to make you better than others. Remember in the passage when Jesus moves the conversation from friendly mode with the one scribe, to criticizing others dressing nice to buy respect - and using the donations of widows to do it. Instead, he praises the widow who

shows her she loves God with all she is by giving all she has... even if it is to the institution Jesus is criticizing.

This reminds me of a professor I had at Seminary who had worked as a journalist. She was given the assignment to get a story from a family who had recently suffered a tragedy. She was to get the story or not come back. In loving the family with her heart she knew it wasn't right (loving) to push them at this time. In loving them with her soul, her identity was to help more than marketing their grief. In loving with her mind she had to ask what was best. And it took loving with all her strength to walk away from her job. This was her loving herself, the family, and God with all her heart, soul, mind and strength.

But if we want to boil it down, it's about something that only happens in healthy relationships: love.

"We are brave and strong because we learned important information about rights, feelings and participation." PWS&D supports a human rights program in Guatemala that not only empowers women by ensuring they know their rights but also equips them with essential skills and knowledge about food security and



nutrition. Through education on when and how to plant vegetables, grow tree seedlings and how to care for livestock, women have more stable incomes and improve their family's access to nutritious meals. "We are happy for our project. We sell the trees in the town and use the money to buy food," shares one of the participants. This program provides women with the resources and skills they need to lift themselves out of poverty and create a more equitable society.




