Intro to the readings

Last week we heard about Peter imitating Jesus by seeing the world as Jesus does, and doing what he can to help, and making sure that God got the credit. The week we're going to hear about Paul imitating Jesus - but in a different way.

We're going to hear two passages. One about when Paul first went to the city of Thessalonica (now called Thessaloniki, in Greece), and the other from a letter he wrote to them later.

One thing to remember is that the words Messiah and Christ mean the same thing - because they are in different languages. It's a bit like saying light and lumière - except Messiah & Christ is the word for a leader who will save people.

🖌 Sermon: Over easy?

Dear Lord, please bless these words and the meditations of our hearts. Amen.

Paul and friends are trying to continue the work of Jesus. They are doing this like any other good student back then - imitating their teacher.

Shall we try some imitations? (like Simon Says) Paul says... touch your nose

- Ps say, "thank God"
- Ps touch your elbows together [*a bit hard*]
- **x** cross your legs
- Ps shout "Yeah Jesus"

Paul was really trying to convince people that he had good news, and Jesus was it.

But, not everybody was sure.

Paul knew this was good news because of the way his life had changed. He had been a very good student studying about God. He thought he knew all about God. When he first heard about Jesus Paul knew that Jesus and his followers were dangerous and not respecting God - so he helped to round them up so they could be silenced.

When on his way to another city to arrest more people Paul encountered Jesus. It was odd as Jesus had died. Still, death didn't stop Jesus and he made Paul pause and reflect on what he was doing. He had Paul spend some time with Christians and listen to them... and Paul changed. Paul discovered that believing in Jesus invited a new way to connect with God - one that brought joy and hope - and he needed to share it with everyone.

This was a big and unexpected change, even for Jesus' disciples who had lived through unexpected changes - like God turning the cross and death into signs of hope and life.

Paul's need to tell people about the joy and hope he found through Jesus led him to travel to many many cities and talk with many many people. As he continued his travels, and spent time arrested, he would write letters back. We have a number of the letters in the Bible (making him the writer of more of the New Testament than anyone else).

Did you notice I said arrested? It wasn't just the disciples who had difficulty accepting Paul, though with most people the issue wasn't his past, but his words.

For example, take his visit to Thessalonica.

It was the capital for the region, and on an important trade route. This brought in money and people - a diversity of people. Even though it's about a month's walk away from Jerusalem there

were enough Jews to set up a synagogue. They did this to help keep their community together and help them how to live God's way (like we have the church).


One Sabbath a new guy (Paul) walks in and joins in their discussions - except he's got strange ideas about God. Some people find it challenging, others think he's being disrespectful, and some are interested.

Imagine a stranger coming in here and trying to convince us that we're thinking about God wrong. Would you feel that the person was disrespecting God? disrespecting you? Would you be offended? Would you be afraid? If they were right, what would that mean to everything that had come before? and what would that mean about everything to come?

I suspect the Jewish community in Thessalonica felt that Paul was disrespectful, they were offended, and afraid. Of course, we always have to be careful when naming a group of people, like saying "The Jews", because we know that some believed what Paul said. It's never fair to assume everyone's the same.

There were even people outside the Jews who believed - which is extraordinary because their beliefs were quite different. These people believing in Jesus led their neighbours/community to also feel disrespect & fear. Imagine living in a world that believes in a whole bunch of gods. And these gods are a bit like kids with toys, and will may throw them or step on them at any time - but especially if they're mad. Paul is saying there's a new God in town who claims to be the top god. If they didn't believe Paul that there was only one god, then they'd really be afraid of what's going to happen when their old gods fight back. (Thankfully there is only one God.)

Then there's the challenge to the government. Paul is talking



What wonder turns into - Lisle Gerrity about this Jesus like he's the Emperor - but what's the Emperor in Rome going to do when he finds out? He'll probably send soldiers to kill anyone following this Jesus - and anyone who gets in the way.

And then there's the shift in focus/priorities that comes with accepting Jesus as the way to live. Jesus puts helping people before religious rules or business. How will that affect things? If we pay

everyone a living wage, then the cost of making things will go up... meaning less people able to buy it, or less money for the owners. What if we make looking after the environment more important than saving money? Will the owners need to take less of a share? Will anyone still want to develop something new? and have the money to do it? Remembering this is a city that survives on trading things, how will putting creation first (including people) instead of money affect business?

With these fears of gods and governments and business you can see why there was the accusation that Paul and friends were turning the world upside-down. You can imagine why that was resisted.

You could face the same troubles now - in pushing for a priority of people over profit, or the even more radical notion that God is active and making the world better - though possibly not as we might define better. People might think you're joking with them - or crazy. They might resent you challenging their view of the world and accuse you of the same thing that Paul was accused of, "*turning the world upside down*". They might be afraid of what would happen if the Jesus way changed society to become 'the way'.

These stories remind us that following Jesus, or imitating Jesus, will bring trouble into your life. I don't think it'll be like Paul, with you having to slip out of town at night, or his friend Jason who got dragged out by a mob for showing Paul hospitality, but it may strain



relationships. Also, Paul writes it brings more joy - "great joy".

These stories from Thessalonica also remind us that God has a special purpose for us, and that this will help people to have a good relationship with God - people we don't even know yet.

Think & pray about what purpose might be, talk about it, and get back to me. This way of imitating Jesus may cause a bit of trouble, but it will also bring great joy.

To God be all the glory



Sunday, April 21

In the Kushkak village in Afghanistan, 42-year-old Guljan lived a simple life with her husband and four children until one day in October 2023, when an earthquake struck their village. Guljan lost her husband and 11-year-old son. After the disaster, she encountered significant challenges in getting assistance due to the gender



disparities present in her village. However, PWS&D's partner recognized her needs and provided Guljan's family with a winterized tent to help endure the harsh weather conditions. PWS&D provided food assistance, as well as other support after the earthquake to help people survive the winter challenges.

DAILY PRAYERS

Sunday, April 21 We give thanks for ministries like Calvin-Goforth's "Hub Club" in Saskatoon, SK that encourage greater social inclusion for seniors and older adults.
